

VANISHING GAME IS TO BE PROTECTED

Mountain Sheep, Antelope and Elk Are on Forbidden List, Board Announces.

WINTER FISHING STOPPED
Deschutes is Closed for Season, as Also in Butte Creek, Where Hatchery Will Be Erected. Reward of \$100 Offered.

Steps to preserve the fish and game of the state were taken by the state Fish and Game Commission in its monthly meeting yesterday at the office in the Pittock block. The Deschutes trout fishing and a reward of \$100 was offered for the arrest and conviction of anyone shooting antelope, mountain sheep or elk at any time in this state.

Extirpation of Antelope Feared.
Antelope have been nearly exterminated, it is said, and are in a fair way to be wiped out altogether unless the strong arm of the law is thrown around them to give additional force to the effort of saving these three types of wild animals from utter extermination.

The closed season on the Deschutes River will be effective such Winter from December 15 to March 31. It was stated that the people of that district are favorable to going away with Winter fishing and the season will be made. A similar ruling was made effective in regard to Butte Creek, where it was decided to establish a hatchery.

Residents to Help With Hatchery.
Construction of this plant will go ahead at once. Residents of that section have shown considerable interest and will assist in the construction of a hatchery.

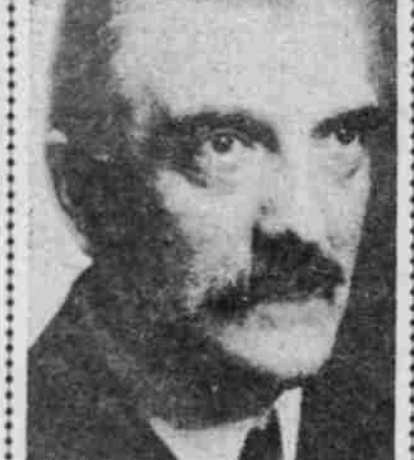
Services for James N. Sutton, Railway Man, Are Arranged.
