I was engaged later by the City of Limiton and the centract was let for \$32,500 for an 18-foot roadway.

Then while the work was underway plans were changed again by the Linnian Council. The roadway was increased to 21 feet and the boulevard was extended further on the south than had been originally planned. These becreases along with the striking of an unexpected amount of rock caused the increase in the total cost to \$155,000.

Liunton Accepts Work.

As the proposition now stands the work has been completed and accepted by the Linutes City Council. Warrants have been issued for payment. Limiton has been ansexed and Portland now faces the necessity of collecting the maney.
