

AUTOPSY SURGEONS UPHOLD BABY DOOM

Inquest Over Defective Bollinger Child Will Be Conducted Today.

PHYSICIANS TO FORM JURY Doctor Who Let Child Die Says All Conscience Demands Protection of Future Generations Against Defectives.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—An autopsy over Baby Bollinger, the defective infant who died last night after his mother and the attending physician agreed not to attempt to prolong his life, was held today by H. G. W. Reinhardt, Cornell's physician, and W. D. McNally, city chemist.

Their conclusions are said to have sustained previously expressed beliefs that the infant was doomed either to death or a life of anguish, and to have testified Dr. H. J. Haiselden, who allowed the child to die, when an operation might have saved his life.

The inquest before a jury of physicians was continued until 10 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Dr. Haiselden welcomed the inquest.

Defects Are Numerous.
The result of the autopsy was read before the jury, which adjourned without any of its members expressing themselves. The autopsy showed the baby was paralyzed on the left side from head to foot, and on the right side from the neck to the shoulder-blade. Curvature of the spine and hemorrhage of the spinal canal were also noted.

The latter, according to physicians, would have caused complete paralysis of the child's body and would have resulted in death, had there been no other cause.

In a signed statement today Dr. Haiselden gave his case:
"I say again that it is our duty to defend ourselves and the future generations against the mentally defective we allow to grow and suffer among us, and add to our burden and our guilt."

Only Mother Is Attentive.
"Farmers select the best stock for reproduction; the best seed, without fault or other disease, for sowing. If inferior humans are permitted to grow and multiply, and defective are allowed to enlarge families, think of it!"

"And only the mother will look after the idiot child. If the mother is taken, the father and brothers and sisters will not care for it. It is picked into an institution forthwith, and there the burden of the mother is taken up by the state, which is the most unfortunate in weighted down."

"Institutions are an abomination. To herd the insane or the lesser defectives like cattle, as is done in a crime and a sin. And, as matters worse, this unfortunate class has no attraction that is going to draw the keeper, the guard, the nurse or whoever takes care of the greater number of those who take care of the insane, many of them, grow unfeeling, unkind and indifferent."

Mothers' Views Ruled.
"And yet I was asked to allow that child to live, knowing what I know. I feel toward some of my critics as I feel toward one who would willingly allow a hydrophobic dog to run in a flock of sheep and do as impudently directed, because this one shrinks from hurting or mauling the dog."

"If children of some of my critics were killed or injured by a defective, they would see a good reason for stopping the supply of the latter in the world. It is only when an argument is brought straight home, into the very core of the home, that reason is born. Too frequently it is truth, unfortunately."

Curb on Defectives Advised.
"One woman I know has a son who is quite subservient, but extremely feeble, swimmer and delirious in the exercise. Once I said to her: 'But suppose someone should behead you, and the mother, with a pitiful promptness, answered: 'Wouldn't that be a blessing?"'

"The mother, I know, did not pray or ask for the boy's drowning. But at least she did not hope against it. So let us be reasonable. Let us approve the sterilization of the insane and the defective and of the children of habitual drunkards, when both father and mother are drunkards."

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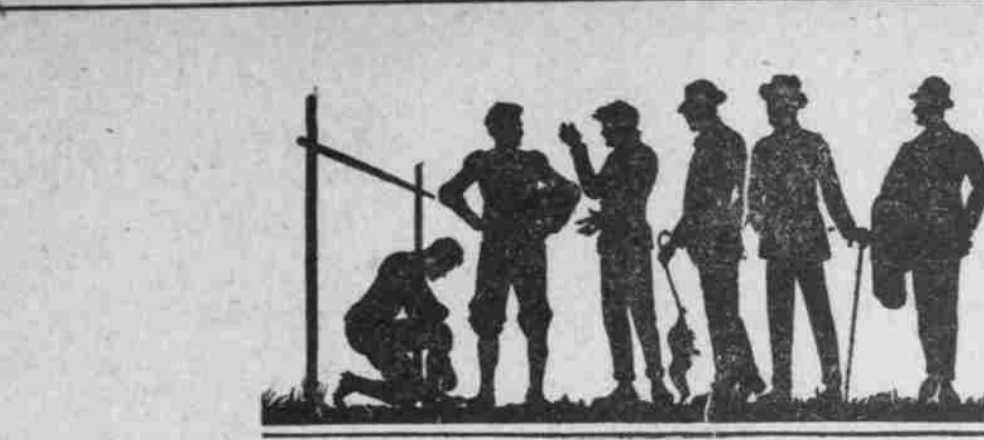
