

RAILWAY ATTORNEYS ARE WITH POWER

Salem Grant Conference Adjourns Without Result--Bad Faith Is Charged.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC SCORED

Railroad Representatives Appear Minus Plans or Authority to Act--New Meeting Set for December 1 to Get Views.

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Unable to obtain any statement from the Southern Pacific Railroad Company's representatives whereby the state and the railroad could agree on a plan for disposal of the Oregon & California railroad grant lands.

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By a resolution introduced by E. M. Garland, of Lebanon, the committee decided to meet again December 1. In the meantime, Ralph Moody and H. A. McAllister, who represented the Southern Pacific at today's conference, will communicate the views of the committee to the railroad officials.

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When it became apparent that the railroad representatives had no authority to act in any way, the committee decided a statement should be made to the railroad charging bad faith, but later reconsidered and killed it, deciding to delay its final report to the conference until the railroad might have another opportunity to define its attitude.

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Reconsideration and withdrawal of the resolution came after Governor Withycombe had pointed out the importance of arriving at a solution of the question. He said that the matter was of such importance that it should give the railroad another chance to appear.

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Whereas, it is the expressed desire of the representatives of the Southern Pacific Company to have the railroad given time to communicate to the railroad the views of this committee; be it

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Resolved, That this committee adjourn, in consideration of the premises, until Wednesday, December 1, at 10:30 A. M.

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Two officers of the German converted cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich, Lieutenant Koch and Dr. Kronack, disappeared from the vessel at Newport News, where she is interned on October 17, later two others disappeared.

MILITARY TRAINING FAVORED BY LABOR

Federation Votes Down Resolution Opposing Propaganda in Public Schools.

MILITARY TRAINING FAVORED BY LABOR

Anti-Militarists Hiss Speakers Who Disagree With Them--Gompers Advocates Preparedness in Interests of Peace.

MILITARY TRAINING FAVORED BY LABOR

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18.—The question of preparedness, coming up unexpectedly, was threshed out before the American Federation of Labor today, with the result that a resolution protesting against the introduction of military propaganda in public schools was voted down.

A final vote was not taken until President Gompers declared that he hoped the day would soon come when the people of the United States would control the militia and regular armed forces in the interest of peace, justice, democracy and humanity.

MILITARY TRAINING FAVORED BY LABOR

The resolution was presented by Adolph Germer, of Mount Olive, Ill., and had been referred to the executive council. A committee having the resolution under consideration reported its concurrence. When this report was made the discussion began, the first to speak in favor of the movement being Delia G. Germer.

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"This military mania has been introduced in some of the public schools in order to instill the susceptible infant mind with pro-military ideas. The military are in the most part made up of able workers, while at the same time the military is the bulwark of the capitalists when the workers are forced to go on strike to maintain their conditions."

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"If there is ever occasion for this country to go to war," said Germer, "it will not be in order to maintain the status quo, but to bring about a new order which will shoulder arms, but the men from the ranks of labor."

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President Gompers said that it had not been intended that the question of preparedness should come up at the time that the plan had been to consider it more especially.

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But now that we are on the subject," said he, "I am in favor of the military forces controlled by a select few, I want it in the hands of the masses of the people of the country. Mr. Gompers said he was opposed to militarism, but that he would like to see the people, the farmer, the worker and the soldier, all trained and organized, and these people should control the militia and the regular forces in the interest of peace, justice, democracy and humanity.

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A resolution presented by delegates from the State of Washington on the question of preparedness was referred to the executive council. It asks for a survey of conditions to ascertain the probable length of workday which will insure employment to all, and it suggests methods by which this can be secured.

Accused of annoying small girls at the West Portland schoolhouse, near Multnomah, until he had started a veritable reign of terror, John Bordeaux was arrested yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Ward Tichenor and Althart and is held in the County Jail on a vagrancy charge.

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Bordeaux is the second man to be arrested in two days on the same charge. Wednesday P. Marino was arrested near Corbett on the same charge after 20 or 30 men had spent most of the night looking for him to mete out summary vengeance.

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A temporary injunction has been granted by Judge Gant of Portland, Oregon, restraining the District Attorney and Sheriff of Multnomah County from enforcing the Sunday closing law. This does not affect any other, however, except Multnomah.

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Span at Salem Declared Dangerous and Improvement Urged.

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DALLAS, Or., Nov. 18.—(Special.)—Sentiment in favor of the construction of a new bridge across the Willamette River at Salem is rapidly spreading over Polk County. The unanimous report of the various engineers who have inspected the present structure that the same is dangerous and that its effect here. The bridge is closed at times when the wind blows to any considerable extent, and thus traffic is greatly hindered and delayed.

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It is believed now that a way may be found whereby Polk County can pay its share of the expense of a new bridge without calling a special election therefor.

A lot and residence located near the corner of Twelfth and Salmon streets, said to be worth \$15,000, was deeded to R. J. Upton, a Portland attorney, by C. F. Tizard, of Tigardville, in exchange for 10 lots in Corvallis Addition, on the Mount Scott carline, valued by the owner at \$8,500, and \$10,000 in cash and mortgages. The trade was handled by the Oregon Home Builders.

Thomas Spillman, of Albany, yesterday completed the purchase of a four-flat building at the corner of East Fourteenth and Madison streets for the consideration of \$15,000. The deal was made through the P. E. Taylor Company. The property was purchased from F. L. Lockwood, a local contractor.

For the building, containing four five-room flats, strictly modern in design and fitted with all modern conveniences, Mr. Lockwood received the deeds to lots 6 and 7, bloc. 4, Magesly Highland; lot 2, bloc. 20, Laurelhurst, and a modern house at 531 Weldier street. The value of these parcels of land and the house totaled \$4800, the rest of the \$15,000 being made in cash and mortgages.

The flats purchased by Mr. Spillman are in a desirable part of the East Side, one block from the Hawthorne carline and within easy walking distance of the center of the city.

The officers of the Central Presbyterian Church are negotiating for the purchase of the Central Christian Church property, which includes a stone structure and a quarter block of land at East Twelfth and Salmon streets. The property and building cost about \$75,000, but there are now outstanding debts and mortgages to the amount of nearly \$10,000. If the Central Presbyterian Church can secure the property by paying off the debts the consideration will be only about one-half the original cost.
