C. H. SHUTT, LOGGING COMPANY PRESIDENT, HAS DISAPPEARED.

Squads of Employees Search Woods and Rivers Believing He May Have Lasted Way in Forest.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Nov. 18.—(Special.)—C. H. Shutt, president of the Grays Harbor Logging Company and one of the best known logging operators of this district, has been missing since 7 o'clock yesterday morning, when he left his car at the company's warehouse about 15 miles northeast of here, to go to camp No. 2, five miles distant.
