POOR ARE BADLY NEGLECTED Charity Organizations Face Crisis as Thanksgiving Approaches.

While others are preparing for the enjoyment of tomorrow, it was brought to light yesterday morning that the poor are being almost forgotten this season when the Associated Charities made the starting announcement that it had received about \$25,000 for the year.

The charitable organizations made no appeal for the season's work, but are looking for individuals to assist in applying Thanksgiving baskets to the poor.

At 10 o'clock this morning more than 100 applications had been applied for relief before 11 o'clock in the morning. At 2 o'clock this list was swelled to more than 200 and at that time two visitors were sent to the homes of the applicants and the assistants to the office had still 25 more cases to be cared for.

On the other hand, the Associated Charities had received calls from just 25 persons who offered to donate Thanksgiving baskets or dinners to poor families.

BISHOP MOORE DIES SLEEPING CAR

Methodist Prelate Found Unconscious in His Berth in Sleeping Car.

CAREER WAS NOTEWORTHY

Four Years' Service in Portland, From 1904 to 1908, and Visits to Friends Here Last Week Are Recalled.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 23.—Bishop David H. Moore, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was stricken with paralysis on a train while returning to his home here today, and died tonight.

Bishop Moore was retired from the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1912, but since that time has taken an active interest in important conferences of the church, including many on the Pacific Coast.

Shortly after being elected bishop in 1904, he was stationed at Shanghai, China, with special jurisdiction over the Methodist missionary work in China, Japan and Korea.

Bishop Moore entered the Civil War in 1865 as a private in Company A, of the Eighty-seventh Ohio Infantry, and for distinguished service his promotion to captain was made.
