'LOS' SO DOES NOT KNOW OF 'BURIAL'

Reason of Parents' Illness Is Withheld Because of Fear of Effects on His Mind.

STAY WITH MOTHER SHORT

Pioneers Now Are Expected to Recover From Shock of Return of Boy Supposed Dead—Mystery of Body Remains Unsolved.

OREGON CITY, Or., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Charles Sturgis does not yet know of his own supposed death and burial, nor of the finding of the body, identified as his, after his escape from the State Hospital for the Insane in April.

Few are allowed to see him, and those only under restrictions, for fear of the effect the weird story may have on his mind. He does not even know the cause of his parents' illness, as overjoyed with the return of their son, but still weak from the shock of his totally unexpected arrival yesterday after they had buried the boy supposed to be his, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar W. Sturgis, of Canby, are slowly recovering, and Dr. H. A. Dedman, the family physician, said tonight that he considered them out of danger.

SON IS ALLOWED WITH PARENTS.

For the first time, the son was allowed to pass some time with his parents today. They were carefully supervised by Mrs. Bertha Hurst, the daughter, for the first conversation, and he was allowed to stay only a short time with his parents.

8000 SERBIANS REPORTED CAPTURED.
