FOR the benefit of the scholarship loan fund of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, the Portland Women's Club will raise its share by giving a play in January. Mrs. Adeline M. Alvord, a prominent clubwoman and reader, has adapted Gaskell's "Dames of Cranford" for the occasion and will direct the first rehearsal at 10 o'clock in the studio at 514 Hillers building.

The scholarship loan fund is accumulated by the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, and is given to help young women who are working their way through schools and colleges. They borrow a certain amount to get their start and after they have graduated and are earning their own way pay it back to the clubs. In the many years in which this fund has been a factor in the Oregon Federation, many one girls have benefited by the generosity of the trust placed in her.

At present, about 30 girls are being assisted. Girls who would otherwise have to go without an education receive a start in life and are equipped to earn a larger salary than they would have had it not been for the help given by the clubwomen. Mrs. Frederick Eggert is chairman of the fund.

## WOMAN'S TRIAL BEGINS

MRS. DAISY MILLER IS CHARGED WITH BURNING HOUSE.

Prosecution Alleges Arson and Fraudulent Insurance Company Out of \$1300.

Just a year from the day her house at 225 Thirteenth street was burned Mrs. Daisy Miller this morning will be placed on trial for setting fire to the house to defraud an insurance company.

Wednesday afternoon the selection of a jury was completed in Circuit Judge Gantenbein's court, and opening statements will be made by the attorney this morning before the taking of testimony begins.

The fire occurred at 3 A. M. November 24, 1914. In September Mrs. Miller was gathered in at Kader Tenor by Fire Marshal Jay Stevens and District Attorney Evans' office. Mrs. Miller had been paid \$1300 insurance money as a result of the fire. Although evidence has been secured connecting her with the organized "arson syndicate," which was crushed by recent proceedings, her arrest at the height of this morning brought her name in the long list of arsonists.

Five lives were seriously endangered by the fire at Mrs. Miller's house. This was a feature which did not accompany any of the other alleged incendiary fires on which prosecutions were based. One fireman was slightly injured in saving a little girl from an upstairs room in the house. Four other people who lived in the house narrowly escaped.

Margaret Mahaney—Turkey Nurse.

It is a long way from a nurse of human beings to a nurse of turkeys, yet Margaret Mahaney has taken the step and met with equal success in each line. Five years ago Miss Mahaney was the envy of her friends because of her skill and salary as a trained nurse. Now she holds an equally enviable position in the eyes of her farmer associates because of her skill in doctoring and nursing turkeys.

## AUTO AIDS CITY WORK

Four Times as Many Milk Samples Collected as Before Car Was Used.

The efficiency of small automobiles in the city service is seen in a report of the milk inspection division of the City Health Bureau. During the past 12 months, with a small automobile, milk inspectors collected nearly 5000 samples from dairymen on their routes, as against 1200 samples in former years.

The milk samples are gathered at all times of the day and night and tested for purity at the city laboratories.
