PATROLCOM IS CONVICTED—"A foolish and unswarred man" was the comment of Municipal Judge Stevenson in regard of PatroLCOM Larsen yesterday when the young man the officer had arrested in the night before was brought into court. Frank Nelson, George Springer, both 21 years old, were arrested by PatroLCOM Larsen in front of Springer's home for disorderly conduct Thursday night and spent the night in jail. The only offense apparent was that they had failed to pay a fine imposed on the street, and both were immediately discharged in court.

COUNCIL MAKES INJURY AWARDS.—Mrs. A. Foster, of 4400 Sixty-third street Southeast, received \$200 from the City Council yesterday as payment in full for her claim of \$300 for injuries sustained by falling on the pavement in Woodstock last Christmas. The Council action was on the application because of the reported destitute circumstances of Mrs. Foster, who is 60 years of age, and has had to spend a large amount for medical care as a result of the accident.

\$50,000 DAMAGE SUIT BROUGHT BY MRS. LOUISE DUTY AGAINST THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC RAILROAD COMPANY AND THE OREGON & MOUNTAIN COMPANY.—A suit brought from the death of Clarence L. Duty two years ago, was started before Circuit Judge Gates yesterday. Duty was employed by the box factory. While crossing the railroad tracks with a truck, a train struck him and killed him. Mrs. Duty has alleged that the train was run by the defendant and the signal bell did not work properly.

CLAUDE LAYMAN HURT.—Claude Layman, 418 Harrison street, suffered an injury to the back of his head Thursday night when he fell from the bus in which he was riding at the intersection of Sixth street and Broadway. He was taken to the Police Emergency Hospital, where three stitches were taken. Mr. Layman is said to have been leaning against the door of the taxi when it flew open hitting him in the back on the pavement. The car was driven by John Danner.
