

VISTA-HOUSE SPIRIT ASSURES SUCCESS

Party Traverses Highway Despite Inclement Weather. '1000 Day' Postponed.

VIEW TERMED WONDERFUL

Rabbi S. S. Wise Is Speechless at Sight—Enthusiasm Shown Indicates Certainty That Resort Will Be Built.

Even though the elements temporarily defeated the "Thousand Dollar Day" celebration, supposed to occur yesterday at Crown Point on the Columbia Highway, enough enthusiasm was manifested among the members of the committee to double assurance of the fact that Vista House will be a reality as soon as the members of the committee and public-spirited citizens of Portland can make it one.

Braving a driving rain and wind that hurried with it a stinging sleet, between 15 and 25 men, members of the Vista House committee and men who had been chosen to take charge of yesterday's ceremonies, drove out the highway with Crown Point as their destination.

Julius Meier, chairman of the day, had preceded these committee men, and when he discovered that the weather was unfit for outdoor ceremony he communicated with other members of the committee and they stopped at the Automobile Club. Accompanied by the builder and lover of the Columbia Highway, Samuel C. Lancaster, he had gone out on the highway early to be sure that Rabbi S. S. Wise would not leave the city without visiting the famous road.

Mr. E. Conklin, vice-president of the Vista House Association, headed the delegation and his presence was succeeded by W. J. Piependrick, secretary of the Vista House Association; Fred Sporer, Ed Werlein, Mark Woodruff, C. C. Overmeyer, L. L. Higgs and J. H. Dunsford. Other members of this party were C. W. Stinger, David Briggs, G. W. Chambers and C. N. Parker. After taking lunch at the Automobile Club, these men returned to the city. Five buses demonstrating the readiness with which these men are willing to work for the success of the Vista House were taken by the staff photographers.

Dr. Stephen S. Wise, accompanied by Mrs. Wise, was taken as far as Shepherd's Dell. He was speechless when he attempted to describe the beauties of the view, even though the weather was so unfavorable.

Ed Werlein, George Chambers, Fred Sporer and Mark Woodruff made the trip to Herdell Point and Mr. Woodruff said on his return that the view, falling along the highway, had formed a silver show, and the scenic effect, Mr. Woodruff declared, was indescribable. He also reported that Multnomah Falls was running full and that the sides of the falls were masses of frozen spray. "It was the finest sight we ever saw," declared the four men.

New York Rabbi, Off to Seattle on Mission, Expresses Gratitude to Portland.

RETURN STOP TO BE BRIEF

B'nai B'rith Hears Lecture on Subject of "Zionist Movement" in Last Address Here—Columbia Highway Lauded After Trip.

After another busy morning, in which he made a speech, took a ride out the Columbia River Highway, met many visitors and gave out an interview to the papers among other strenuous accomplishments, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, rabbi of the Free Synagogue, New York City, left Portland at 2:10 o'clock yesterday for Seattle. Mrs. Wise accompanied him.

Dr. Wise spoke at Seattle last night and will devote today to his mission of gathering funds for relief of the starving Jews of Palestine. He and Mrs. Wise will be in Portland about an hour Tuesday morning, between trains. They will arrive from Seattle at 3:30 and depart for the East via Salt Lake City at 5:30.

Just before departing on the train Dr. Wise gave out the following statement:

"I cannot leave Portland without making this public acknowledgment of the gracious and generous hospitality of the people of Portland. Mrs. Wise and I knew that we were coming back to friends, but it was good indeed to find not only that one is remembered, but that friends are ready to take one back to their hearts."

"It has been a great joy to us to see Portland again in its new strength, and to find the beautiful Portland of old has become one of the great cities of the Nation."

"I desire at this time to make special expression of my gratitude to the good men and women of Portland who have been ready to respond to the cry of the needy in behalf of whom I appealed."

"Ben Selling will serve as chairman of the committee of the relief fund and Julius L. Meier will act as treasurer. To either chairman or treasurer contributions may be sent by those who have not yet had an opportunity of forwarding their gifts."

Early in the morning Rabbi and Mrs. Wise went out the Columbia River Highway as far as Shepherd's Dell with Samuel C. Lancaster and Nathan Strauss. Dr. Wise, who made a tour of Europe two years ago, declared that with the European highways this fresh in his memory, he could say that the Columbia River Highway was the most grand and inspiring of all.

Dr. Wise spoke before an audience of several hundred in the B'nai B'rith building, Thirteenth and Mill streets, at 11:30 o'clock. His subject was "The Zionist Movement."

One of the features of the meeting was an orchestra composed of more than a score of violins, played by youngsters between 6 and 16 years old, while 30 other children sang the Zionist anthem and "America."
