

SYRACUSE HEAVIER THAN AGGIE ELEVEN

Difference in Average Weight Is 11 Pounds—Westerners' Backfield Is Beefier.

EACH HAS ONE STAR BACK

Abraham and Wilkinson Are Bulwarks of Opposing Attacks—Each Coach Expects to Stop Opp's Freak Style of Play.

When Syracuse and the Oregon Aggies clash on Multnomah field Wednesday afternoon in the season's most important intercollegiate game, all the advantages of weight will be with the New York eleven.

Figures compiled yesterday, when the coaches showed that Syracuse's line will average 332 pounds in the main, as against 178 pounds for the Oregon Aggies, and that the grand average of the teams will be 188 pounds for Syracuse and 177 pounds for the Oregon Aggies.

The Western team will have the edge in the backfield avoidance. Coach Stewart's quartet weighs around 175 pounds as against 144 for the Syracuseans.

The game will not be won or lost by a few pounds of beef," said Coach O'Neil, of Syracuse. "When a team weighs around 175 to 178 pounds it is pretty heavy enough."

Two remarkable backfield stars will be found pitted against each other Wednesday, in Fullback Wilkinson, of Syracuse, and Halfback Abraham, of the Aggies. Both are being strongly touted for all-American honors.

While all those who have prepared all-Eastern teams to have a good time from the consensus of opinion to date show the following players in the lead: Ends—Soury, Harvard, and Higgins; Tackles—Wagon, Wisconsin, and Shull, Chicago.

Guard—Spear, Dartmouth, and White, Syracuse. Quarterback—Pittsburg. Halfbacks—Wilkinson, Syracuse and Hastings, Pittsburg. Fullback—Mahan, Harvard.

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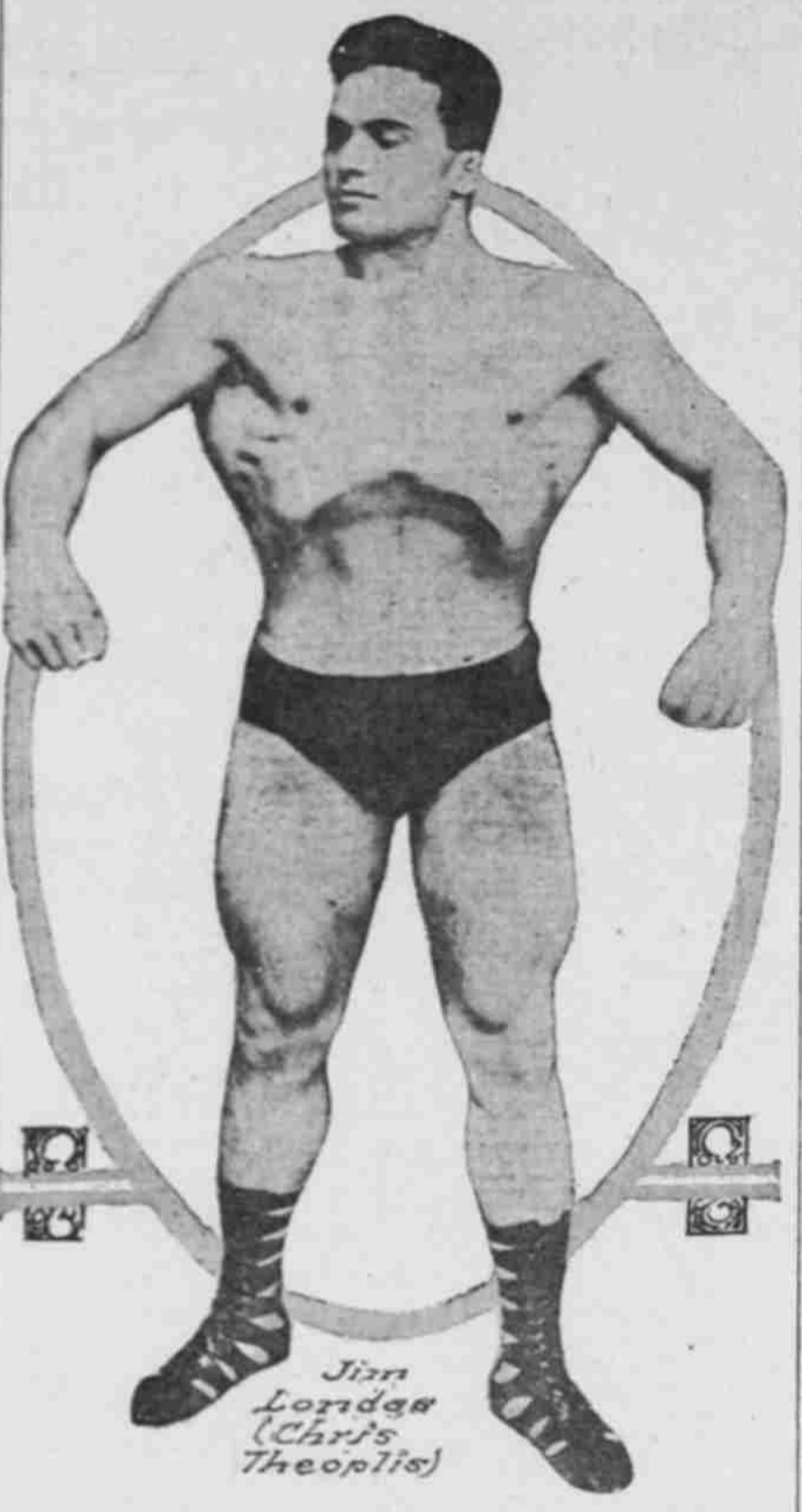
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CHRIS THEOPLIS CHANGES NAME SO WRESTLING FANS CAN PRONOUNCE IT.

Schlachter, Guard, and Rose, Halfback, Just Nosed Out of Choice on Mythical Eleven of Eastern Football Stars.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—The close of the Eastern football season finds a wide variance of opinion among followers of the final rating of the leading teams and the players to be selected for the mythical all-Eastern team.

Senior First Choice at End. Soury, Harvard; Lamberton, Princeton; Higgins, Pennsylvania State; Shelton, Cornell, and Stewart, of Colgate, all have their backers for the winning top position.

At tackle, Gilman, of Harvard, is the popular choice, with Abell, Colgate; Schultz, Washington, and Lee, Furman; Hurry, Kansas; Rutger, and McCulliff, of Dartmouth, in the running.

For guards, Spear, Dartmouth; White and Schlachter, Syracuse; Hogg, Princeton, and Black, of Yale, are the leading candidates.

At center, Fock, Pittsburg, is the player most frequently mentioned, although Cook, Cornell; Gennert, Princeton, and McEwan, Army, are the recipients of votes.

For the backfield, Barrett of Cornell is the logical quarterback; while Mahan, Harvard, leads in the race for fullback.

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TWO COACHES SHINE

Bezdek and Stewart Add to Laurels in Last Season.

BOTH RANKED AMONG BEST Career of Oregon Football Pilot Is Brilliant From Outset—Aggie's Mentor Has Long Record in Turning Out Winners.

With the 1915 Northwest Conference football season ended, it might not be inappropriate to call attention to the fact that the two big Oregon colleges can boast of two of the foremost football coaches in the country.

Hugo Bezdek, coach of the state champion University of Oregon eleven, is a former Chicago star, and Dr. E. J. Stewart, coach of the Oregon Aggies, gained his gridiron experience at Western Reserve and Mount Union colleges.

Hugo Bezdek was born in 1884 at Prague, Austria-Hungary. In 1905 he registered at Lake High, Chicago, and, at the age of 18, entered Chicago and

Dr. Stewart took charge of athletics at the Oregon Agricultural College in 1912, and his first basketball team won the Northwest championship. He has had good success in all lines at Oregon, and his teams made great strides with Oregon in football for the state title, and lost to Oregon a week ago 9-0, after previously defeating the Michigan Aggies.

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HOCKEY STARS EN ROUTE

ENTIRE SEPTET OF UNCLE SAM'S TO START PRACTICE TODAY. Dunderdale and Murray to Arrive Today—Races Put On Ice Risk as Added Saturday Feature.

Tommy Dunderdale and Tommy Murray, the latter of Winnipeg, will arrive today in time to attend the first official workouts of the Portland professional ice hockey players this afternoon.

Both puck chasers were supposed to be here yesterday, but word was received by Manager Savare last night that his athletes would not arrive from the North until this morning.

Eight Uncle Sams are to be out this afternoon at the Portland Ice Hippodrome to go through their workout stunts between 2 and 3 o'clock. Practice will be held each day and before Wednesday the entire squad which will represent Portland in the Pacific Coast Hockey Association will be on hand.

J. George Keller, assistant manager of the Portland Ice Hippodrome, has opened a new feature which will be held every Sunday afternoon immediately after the regular skating session has been completed. Speed races will be held in the first race yesterday. Walter Park finished first, while Charles Uksila, former Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club hockey player but now one of the Portland Uncle Sams, was second.

In the relay race the Lincoln High School quartet, composed of G. Raab, R. Kaufmann, H. Breidenstein and P. Willford, had an easy time winning from a picked team at the Portland Ice Hippodrome. The Lincoln boys have issued a challenge to any relay team in Portland for a match race. Each skater must go a quarter of a mile, in the relay, while the speed race is a half mile.
