It was a sudden attack that came upon him last Wednesday and on Friday ne-cessitated his removal to the hospital. His condition steadily grew worse. He

His condition steadily grew worse. He was 21 years old and had been engaged in newspaper work since 1911. Frank Gibb was born in Seattle and attended grammar school here. When it became time for him to enter high achool he went to Bellingham with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry W. Gibb, in his senior year he became a reportor on the Bellingham Reveille, working after school. Later he was on the Brit-ish Columbian, at New Westminster, B. C., where he also acted as corre-apondent of the Post-Intelligencer. February, 1913, he was made sport-ing editor of the Scattle Sun when that ng editor of the Seattle Sun when that became sporting editor of the Seattle Star, which position he held until his icath. He was a former student of the University of Washington and a mem-

Two Elevens Undefeated.

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




No attempt was made to make the goal kick by the Columbia Park play-ers, because Captain Edwards and his East Portlanders walked off the field
