

### CHIVAROUS MAIL COLLECTOR KILLED

#### Postal Employee Slugged for Trying to Prevent Mis-treatment of Women.

### ASSAILANT IS ARRESTED

#### Fellow-Workers Demand That Murderer Be Brought to Justice and Federal Government May Take Hand in Case.

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—(Special).—Charles Petzel, a young employee of the United States postal service, paid with his life last night for the performance of an act of civility.

This act involves the Federal Government in the murder wave now prevalent in Chicago, which is keeping well up to the average of one each day.

To protect a girl from physical abuse, Petzel, while on duty and dressed in his uniform as a Government mail collector, protested because a woman was being maltreated. For this he was beaten to the pavement and received a fracture of the skull, from which he died four hours later.

New Admits His Guilt. The girl in whose behalf Petzel interposed—Mabel Carr alias Nataka, a near slip of a woman, 22 years old—is being held by the police together with the wigeon. Late tonight detective sergeants arrested George ("Frank") Nataka, a burly young fellow, at the home of the woman, who was constrained with the statements of 11 witnesses, who had been previously locked up pending further investigation into Petzel's death. Nataka readily admitted his guilt, the police say.

Nataka admitted to me he struck Petzel in a fit of anger and then fled, leaving the man's skull had been fractured. "I asked him why he beat the mail collector and Nataka said he became angry when the woman interfered in a quarrel between Nataka and Mabel Carr, who calls herself Nataka's wife. He said he was sorry when he learned that Petzel had died from the slugging.

Companions Demand Vengeance. Petzel, who was 21 years old and had a wife and seven-month-old babe, became the subject of resolutions adopted today at a mass meeting of civil service employees of the United States Government. The postal employees, as a body, unanimously adopted resolutions denouncing his act of gallantry as the duty of his office and as a public "leave nothing undone to bring his murderer to justice."

Although the police thus far have assumed full charge of the investigation of Petzel's death, Government agents probably will be brought into the case. Justice Department said he would refer the case to the United States District Attorney when informed the mail-carrier met his death while on duty.

Both trios are decidedly worth hearing and are educational in musical value. Not in any sense have the two pianists been chosen—any, one of them would have been probably a better choice. The three musicians gave a splendid and interesting rendition of both trios named on the programmes.

The next chamber concert of this series occurs December 11.

Mrs. Brinkman retained a cut on the head and bruised her forehead while Ghoslen, who was riding with Ghoslen, was also arrested.

### 4 VICTIMS BURIED

#### Union Murderer and Three Girls Lie in One Grave.

#### HUNDREDS ARE MOURNERS

#### Condition of Mrs. G. L. Huffman, Widow of Perpetrator of Poison Tragedy, Is Grave, and Her Mother Is Sufferer Also.

UNION, Or., Nov. 28.—(Special).—Three little white caskets and one large black one were lowered side by side in one large grave in the cemetery in this city this afternoon after one of the most pathetic funerals ever held here.

The three tiny white caskets contained the bodies of the three little daughters—Margaret, Josephine and Ruth, aged 4, 4 and 6 years, respectively, while the large black casket contained the body of the father, G. L. Huffman, who gave the fatal poison candy and committed suicide at Prairie City last Wednesday.

The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Collins, under the auspices of the Women of the World, and, despite the fact of the cold weather, hundreds of people attended the last sad rite.

The little girls acted as pallbearers for the three little victims, and the Woodmen marched in a body preceding the bears.

The condition of Mrs. Huffman's aged mother, Mrs. Shaw, of this city, is also grave from the shock of the tragedy.

### RIVER ASTRAY ON MAP

#### Kuskokwim, Second in Alaska, TO BE RELOCATED.

#### Coast Survey Says Resources Are Promising and Country Eventually Will Be White Man's Home.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 28.—The Kuskokwim River, second in Alaska, will have to be relocated on the map, as a result of surveys made during the past summer by the coast survey party.

The coast survey party, which sailed on what heretofore has been accepted as a reasonably correct map.

Last summer the coast survey party surveyed the Kuskokwim from the head in Washington, August, 1913, Clarke County has paid out in pensions \$14,242.17. This amount will pay up until January 1, 1916, providing no more are granted before then.

### GEORGE BREEDS WORK OF MR. CADY

#### Blame for Delay in Harvesting Penitentiary Flax Crop Is Laid to Emil Hansett.

### MR. OLCOTT IS CRITICISED

#### Chief Executive and Mr. Kay Both Agree That Change in Management Would Be Apt to Result in Raising Experiment.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 28.—(Special).—Convinced that J. C. Cady, superintendent of the Penitentiary flax plant, is fully competent to handle the affairs, and that the state flax-raising project is assured of success, Governor Withycombe today reiterated his assertions that criticism of Cady at this time was unwarranted.

With Treasurer Kay agreeing that Secretary of State Olcott was wrong when he asked them to join with him in removing Cady from charge of the flax work, the Governor refused to acquiesce and said things now stand as they are.

Neither the Governor nor Treasurer take his place, as they are equally responsible for taking drastic action. As they pointed out, to remove Cady now would only serve to cripple the flax raising project.

Mr. Olcott Criticised. "I am exceedingly sorry that this article against Mr. Cady has come up, for it will only serve to hamper his work. It is to be hoped that we have a majority on the Board of Control who are sound on the flax question."

Officials here looked askance at the article appearing in the Oregon Journal today that Eugene Boese or his son-in-law, Emil Hansett, could have handled the work, to be distributed, which would be the flax seed.

When Cady took charge because Hansett had not a complete list of the location of the various flax fields, some delay was encountered in going about Marlon and Polk counties.
