# CONSPIRACY TRIAL IS NEARING CLOSE

Government Rests in Presenting Evidence Against Steamship Officials.

MOTIONS ARGUED TODAY

Defendants May Take Stand in Behalf of Selves-Prosecution Refuses Directly to Accuse Captain Karl Boy-ed.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23,-The Government's case against officials of the Hamburg-American line on trial for conspiracy to deceive and defraud the United States by despatching relief steamers with supplies from American ports to German cruisers at sea in 1914, was closed today. The defense may present all its evidence tomorrow and the case be given to the jury Wednes-

day.

Three motions will be heard by Federal Judge Howe at the forenoon session tomorrow, a motion to dismiss the indictment and a motion to direct the verdict for the defense, and, these fail-ing, a motion that the fury be in-structed to disregard all testimony concerning the steamer Marina Quesada, which the defense contends, was in no way connected with their operations.

Argument to Be Protracted. Argument on these motions, it was in-dicated today, will be somewhat pro-tracted; so much so, in fact, that the jury was excused for the entire forenoon session, or until 2 P. M. tomor-row. One or more of the defendants, it seemed established today, will take the witness stand for the defense, William Rand, Jr., their counsel, when asked if he expected to place any of them on the stand, declined to say what he ex-
