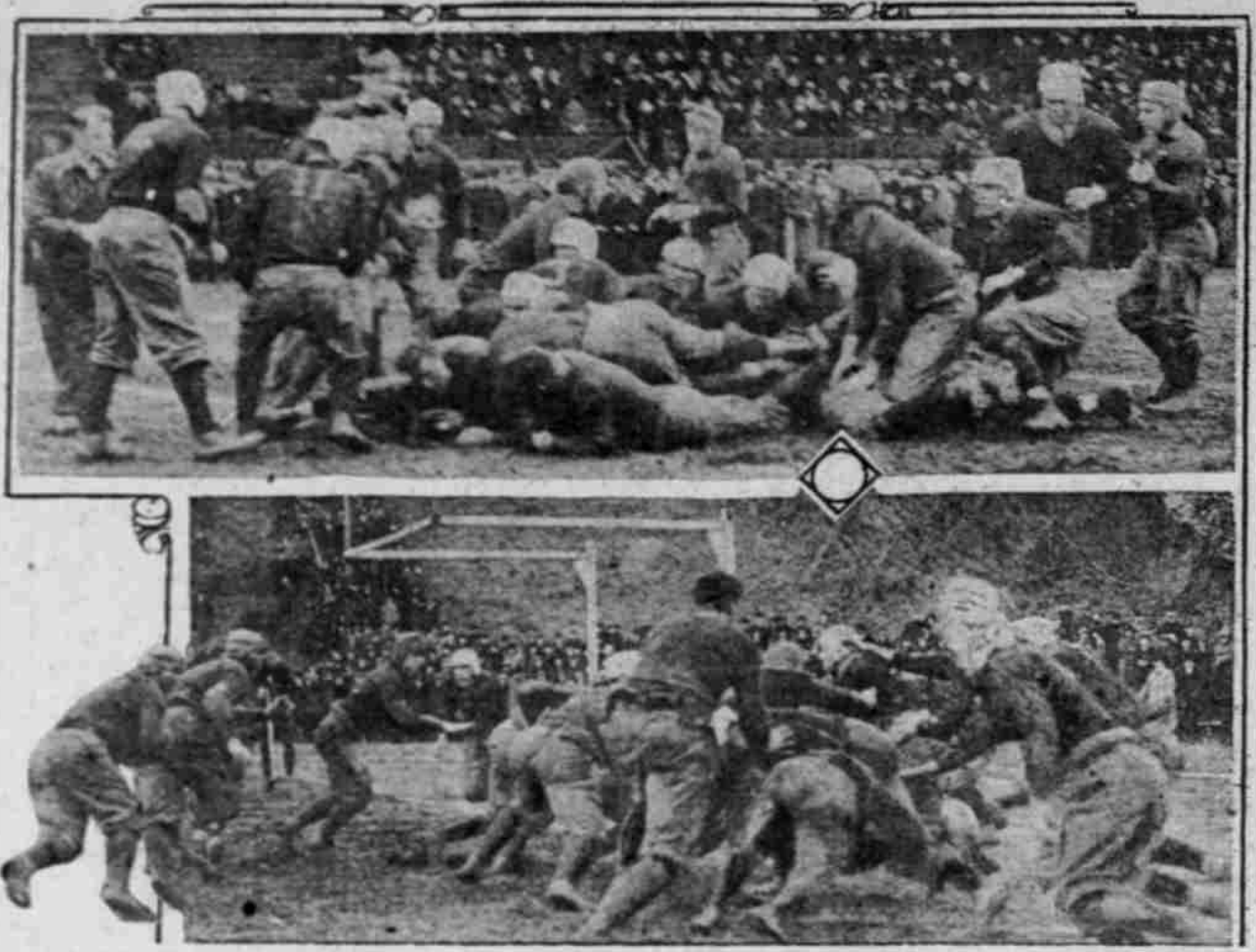

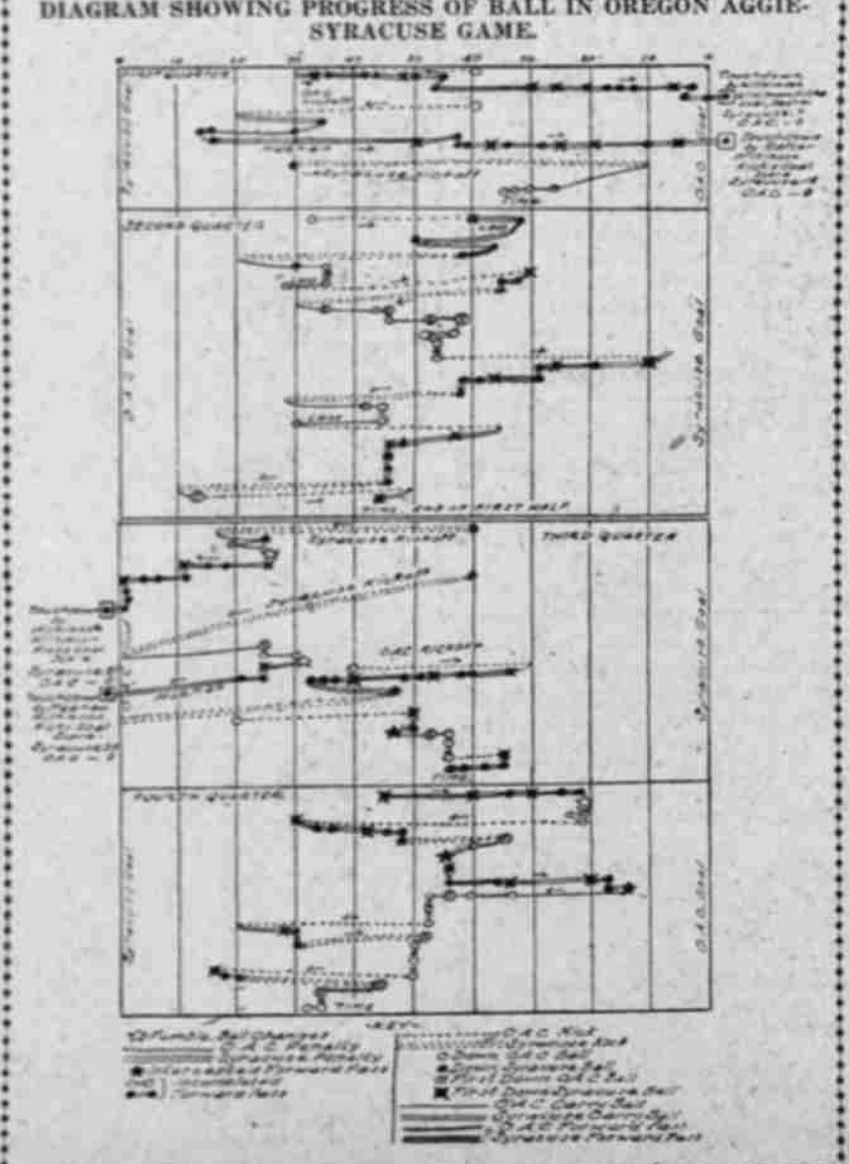

HARBORS DELEGATES TO GO

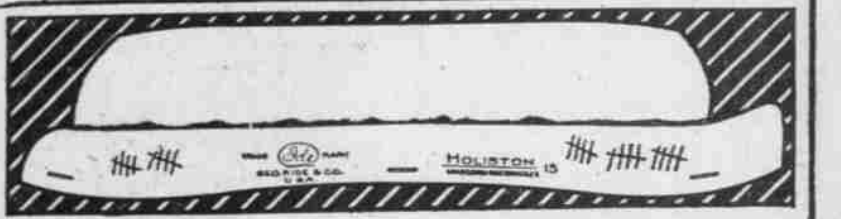
Chamber to Send J. N. Teal and C. W. Hodson to Washington.

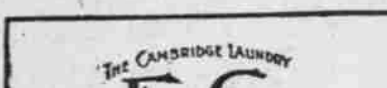
Messrs. Teal and Hodson are sent to do everything within their power to safeguard an adequate appropriation for the continuation of existing projects on the river and harbor work of this region.

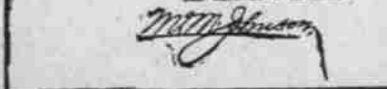
