

FAT STOCK ON SALE AT SHOW TODAY

Choicest Animal to Be Offered Will Be Idaho's Grand Champion Steer.

HOGS AND SHEEP JUDGED

Judges, Visitors and Exhibitors Unite in Declaring Display of Cattle at Kenton is Best Ever Seen in Northwest.

Judging at the Fifth Annual Pacific International Livestock Exhibition was concluded yesterday in Holstein, Jersey, Ayrshire and Guernsey in the cattle exhibits. Cotswolds and Lincoln were the only two classes of sheep that were judged in which there was competition and two breeds of swine, Berkshire and Poland China, received their awards. A few classes of the show were to be judged.

The biggest thing on the program for today is the auction of the fat stock that will begin this morning at 10 o'clock. And the chief attraction is the collection of fat cattle and the animal that will first fall under the auctioneer's hammer is the grand champion northern steer from Idaho. This animal has never lost in any of the classes in which he has been entered and has invaded classes to which approach of greater age and has competed with many prize steers during his short life, for he is but a senior yearling. He was born in December, immature, and a short time after his birth was taken with pneumonia.

Recovering from that illness, he began to fatten and, according to the exhibition, Professor R. J. Judding, of the University of Idaho, he has since been gaining at the rate of two and a half to three pounds a day. His weight is now 1325 pounds. His mother is a thoroughbred Shorthorn. His father and she was sired by the grandson of Gold Crown, reared by J. H. McCrossen, Fairview, Wash., one of the best-known breeders in the Northwest.

F. W. Harding, secretary of the American Shorthorn Breeders' Association and a man who has been champion of the breed for years, declared the champion to be the best specimen of Shorthorn breed that he had ever seen. John L. Smith, a prominent Shorthorn breeder of the Northwest, has declared the same thing. The champion is due to bring a fancy price.

Stock Declared Best Exhibited. Judges, visitors and exhibitors unite in asserting that the stock that is now on exhibition at the yards at Kenton is the best that has ever been gathered in the Northwest. There are prize pens and individual animals that merit special attention: prize herds, and cattle, sheep and swine by the carload lots.

One of the individual animals that has created unusual interest is a registered Duroc Jersey barrow, named Woodrow Wilson. It is but 11 1/2 months of age and already has attained a weight of 750.

The students judging contest was concluded yesterday, with the result that Washington State College won with a score of 2132 points. Oregon Agricultural College was second, Idaho third and California fourth. The judging was made at the State College, with points for perfect judgment and 25 for a perfect reason.

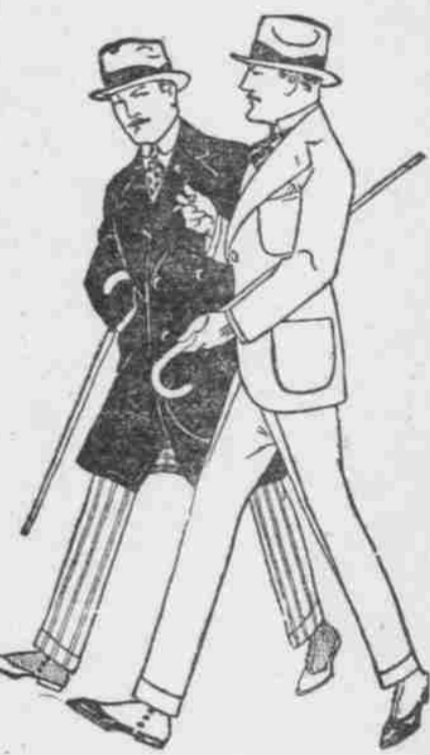
Club to Give Fountain ROTARIANS PLEDGE FUNDS FOR HIGHWAY STRUCTURE.
