BERLIN, via London, Dec. 7.-Vigorus and unrestrained discussion of the problem of food regulation continues in the budget committee of the Reichstag. Full reports of the debate are not appearing in the newspapers, but the accounts published indicate that one aspect of the discussion consists of controversial attempts to lay the blame for various alleged failings on the shoulders of producers, dealers or sumers, or representatives of different ministries.

Both the Minister of the Interior, Herr Delbrueck, and the Prussian Min-ister of Agriculture, Baron von Schor-lemer, have come under fire.


