WASHINGYON, Dec. 8 .- Addressing the members of the Democratic National Committee, who were his luncheon givets at the White Rouse, President Wilson today deciared, after explaining that he did not think it necessary to address the committee in parliamentary language, that "any who says we can be besten in the 1916 campaign is talking through his hat."

# M'ADOO WOULD TAX

Secretary Also Asks Further Provision for Preventing Evasions of Laws.

BOND ISSUE IS OPPOSED

Recommendation That Stamp Taxes and Duty on Sugar Be Continued Is Reaffirmed-Increased Imports Predicted.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo, in his annual report, a summary of which was made public today, outlined his plans for about Mexico City in October the daily number of deaths due to starvation was about 270. He added that he considered it a conservative estimate to say that at least 2000 were dying every day in the whole of Mexico for lack of food or on account of disease atwendant on familine conditions.

In the streets, he declared, "I often saw gaunt women and children clawing in barren garbage heaps for scraps, I saw groups of pathetic wretches waiting hours before doors of private houses for a cupful of soup. I saw acres of pauper graves, where the dead were buried so fast that the tin name plates required by law were not set.

A further recommendation reads as follows:

"By the act of October 22, 1914, a tax of 55 cents per proof gallon is now imposed on brandy and wine spirits used in fortifying domestic wine. This tax, however, will, under the provisions of the act, expire by limitation January 1, 1916. It is therefore recommended that a like tax be imposed on all brandy or spirits used in fortifying such wine on and after that date.

"The policy of providing for the ex-penditures of the Government by taxa-tion and not by hond issues," said the report, "is undoubtedly a sound one and should be adhered to. A wise, sound and permanent policy of raising the additional revenue required for preparedness and the expenditures of the Government should therefore be devised and adopted."


