HEALTH BUREAU REPORT FILED.—Work of the City Health Bureau during November is shown in the monthly report of City Health Officer Marcellus, filed yesterday with City Auditor Barber. The report shows the bureau made 224 marks inspections, condemned 4622 pounds of meat; made 1348 sanitary inspections, gathered 420 samples of milk, inspected 15,327 school children and did a great deal of other work in handling contagious diseases, dairy inspections and inspections of vegetables.

LANE R. HOUSTON'S FUNERAL IS HELD.—Funeral services for L. R. Houston, who died Tuesday at his home, 125 Graham avenue, were held yesterday at Flanery's chapel and the interment in the cemetery.

SAVED HEART FORTUNATELY ELUCT.—A B. Heston, who elected chief ranger for the Sacred Heart Court of Foresters; vice-chief ranger, Joseph Smith; secretary, A. Taaffe; financial secretary, Francis Dorr; treasurer, Fred Ulmer; George Kampf and William Schaefer; treasurer, Emil Furrer; speaker, Gerald Sperry. C. H. Kenneth is the most chief ranger. He addressed the court on the duties of the newly elected officers. George Dyer, deputy state chief ranger, spoke briefly and commended the court for its activity.

WIRELESS PERMIT IS GRANTED.—Portland is to have another large wireless telegraph receiving station. The City Council yesterday granted a permit to the Federal Telegraph Company to install receiving wires over State street, between the Board of Trade building and the Chamber of Commerce building. The wires will be put high into the air to avoid the buildings.

RAILWAY MORTGAGE APPROVED.—The Portland & Oregon City Railway Company yesterday was granted permission by the City Council to give a mortgage to the Security Savings & Trust Company of \$25,000 on the railway line the company is building between Oregon City and Portland. Right to make the loan had to be secured from the Council under the provisions of the company's franchise.

CONCERN HOWE IN DECEMBER 14.—The Christian Business College-Glee Club is preparing for the college benefit entertainment at Alumni Hall, Grand avenue and Clackamas streets next Tuesday evening. Miss Mildred T. Clary is the director. There also will be selections by some of the leading artists. A special local quartet also will appear.

MARION AVENUE PETITION DENIED.—Marion avenue from the river to Twenty-third street is to remain 28 feet between curbs. The City Council yesterday overruled petitions asking that the street be made 24 feet wide. The petition was presented because it is proposed to put in curbs and concrete sidewalks along the full length of the street.

PUBLIC SERVICE BONDS FIXED.—A bond of \$5000 must be furnished hereafter by all public service corporations obtaining valuable permits from the city. The City Council yesterday passed an ordinance fixing this amount. While bonds have been required in the past, the amount has been fixed by the Council before.
