SEANGHAI CONSUL COMING.—Thomas
Sammons, American Consul-General at
Shanghai, China, and on a leave of

to Portland business men. Mr. Sam-
mons is regarded as one of the best-
informed men in the public service
occupying a post in China and what-
ever he says in regard to Oriental
business prospects it is expected will
be of great importance to any export
on this side of the Pacific contemplat-

when he is to arrive.

STOCKHOLM MANUFACTURERS VISIT.—A.
M. C. Schuchman, representing A. Johnson
& Co., of Stockholm, which concern
owns the Johnson steamship line and
is heavily interested in the manufac-
ture of steel and other products and in
their export from Sweden, is passing a
part of this week in Portland. The
special effort he is making on the pres-
ent trip is to introduce here more
thoroughly the Swedish tool steel and
other metal products that Scandi-
navia is offering to the world.

FISHERMAN WINS VERDICT.—Because
the towboat Maria ran down his boat
and carried away his nets, C. W. Horst,
a fisherman, was awarded \$450 dam-
ages against the Columbia Contract
Company by a jury Saturday. Judge
Davis heard the case yesterday. Horst
had sued for treble damages, but Judge
Davis ruled that under the method of
bringing the suit he could recover
only actual damages. The full amount
of actual damages was allowed by the
jury.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN DIES.—Byron
Grant, aged 74, died Tuesday night at
