Lyendecker was taken into custody at his office at 343 Fifth avenue, where he has been selling antiques. The agents of the Department of Justice declars they found in his office maps and drawings of the Welland Canal. Both men are said to have admitted that they had been along the canal on the American side, but asserted that they did not cross into Canada.

Conspiracy Formally Charged. The specific charge preferred against Keenig and Lyendecker is violation of section 12 of the United States penal code, which prohibits the planning within the boundaries of the United States of a military expedition against a foreign nower. a foreign power.

Lyendscher says he is an America citizen and has admitted, it is said, that he has been employed by Knenig. Koenig took out his first citizenship papers in this country 10 years ago, but mever applied for his second. The Gov-ernment agents assert that Koenig has been known by many names.
