

WELLAND CANAL
PILOTS CHARGED

Hamburg-American Secret Service Agent, Clerk and Antique Dealer Held.

AID OF SPIES IS ALLEGED

Plan Said to Have Been to Destroy Waterway by Use of Nitro-Glycerine—Conspiracy Laid on American Soil.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Paul Koenig, formerly head of the secret service of the Hamburg-American line, and Richard Emil Lyndesacker were arrested tonight by agents of the Department of Justice, charged with conspiring to attempt to blow up the Welland Canal.

Koenig was arrested at 45 Broadway in the office of the Hamburg-American line. Before the war he was in charge of the steamship company's bureau of investigation, but since then it is charged he had been the head of the German secret service in the United States.

Lyndesacker was taken into custody at his office at 241 E. 42d street, where he has been selling antiques. The agents of the Department of Justice declared they found in his office maps and drawings of the Welland Canal. Both men are said to have admitted that they had been along the canal on the American side, but asserted that they did not cross into Canada.

Conspiracy Formally Charged. The specific charges preferred against Koenig and Lyndesacker is violation of section 11 of the United States penal code, which prohibits the planning within the United States of the overthrow of a military expedition against a foreign power.

Lyndesacker says he is an American citizen and has admitted, it is said, that he had been employed by Koenig. Koenig took out his first citizenship papers in this country 10 years ago, but never applied for his American citizenship. Government agents assert that Koenig has been known by many names.

The arrests were made by William M. Coffey, in charge of the Government's centrally investigation; Joseph H. Baker, his assistant; and Captain Thomas Tunney, of the New York bureau of explosives and combustibles. The actual plan to blow up the canal was mapped out in Buffalo, according to the complaint, which alleges that Koenig and Lyndesacker had been in Buffalo for the last few years, where they were in the employ of the Welland Canal.

Chief Photographed by Spies. The precise details of the alleged plot were withheld by the Federal authorities, but it is understood that Koenig and Lyndesacker had employed spies who went out from Buffalo and Niagara Falls to photograph the canal and make arrangements for blowing up the waterway at its most important point and that nitro-glycerine was to be used as the explosive.

Koenig and Lyndesacker were in Buffalo about four days, according to the authorities, and returned to New York with the intention of the alleged plot left in the hands of their agents. As far as is known by the Department of Justice, it was said tonight, they had not abandoned the carrying out of the plot when the arrests were made.

Koenig is credited with 12 aliases in the complaint. They include German, English and Italian names. Koenig had two aliases which he employed in other activities, it was said by the authorities.

Use of Troops Not Involved. While the complaint specifically mentions that the Federal agents proposed to "set on foot a military enterprise," it was said by Assistant District Attorney Wood, who prepared the indictment, that this did not mean the use of troops. He indicated that only a few persons were concerned in the alleged conspiracy.

Captain Coffey in the complaint that it would be contrary to public policy and injurious to the interests of the United States to reveal the sources of his information.

Prior to the arrest of the men the Federal grand jury began an investigation into this newest phase of alleged violation of the Espionage statute which it is intimated will embrace other activities of Koenig's organization.

Koenig, under the name of Stenmer, it was charged, was responsible for obtaining from Gustav Stahl the affidavit in which he declared he had seen guns on board the Lusitania and was carried off her last voyage. Stahl was convicted of perjury and sentenced to 12 months in prison at Atlanta.

Late tonight two detectives connected with the New York "bomb squad" arrived at police headquarters with Frederick Metzler, 21 years old, a clerk in the office of the Hamburg-American line, whom they arrested at his home at Jersey City in connection with the alleged conspiracy in which Koenig and Lyndesacker are involved.

The Welland Canal connects Lakes Erie and Ontario, extending a distance of 21 miles from Port Colborne to Port Dalhousie. It is the route which vessels take from Chicago and other Great Lakes ports to reach the Lawrence River. Grain shipments from these ports are thus transported to Europe. Had the canal been destroyed it would have compelled the shipment of bulk before they could have been loaded on vessels.

INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENT INSURANCE COMMISSION, of which two were fatal. The fatalities were Ellis Ross, of Salem, and Julius Johnson, of Frankston.

OF THE total accidents reported, 38 were subject to the workmen's compensation act, 33 were from public utility corporations, 12 were from farms and corporations which have rejected the act.

FOUR KILLED IN STORM

HEAVY WIND SWEEPS THROUGH MISSISSIPPI AND ALABAMA.

Many Persons Are Injured and Damage to Property in Several Counties Is Reported Severe.

MERIDIAN, Miss., Dec. 17.—Four lives were lost and many persons injured in a wind storm that demolished scores of houses today in East Mississippi and adjoining counties of Alabama.

The only known deaths were at Giles, Miss., where four persons, two women and two children, were killed in the collapse of a dwelling house. Nearly a hundred buildings, described mostly by agencies, were blown down at Giles and a score of persons were injured.

Injuries and much property damage resulted in much damage to farmhouses, but whether there were any deaths is not known tonight.

Information from Columbus, Miss., was that the heaviest damage had been reported between that city and Fayette, Ala. Millport, Ala., suffered heavily, it was said, and several persons were injured there.

5 PER CENT MARGIN UPHELD

Oregon Firms May Receive Preference Over Outside Bidders.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 17.—(Special.)—Firms manufacturing cattle feed dressed products within this state are being given a 5 per cent preferential over bids when competing with firms outside the state, if the State Board of Control sees fit to allow it, in response to a request from the board.

The question arose when the board opened bids for supplies for state institutions yesterday and a representative of the Union Meat Company asked if Oregon meat dealers would be entitled to the 5 per cent preferential over outside bidders under a law passed by the last Legislature. The Attorney-General says.

If cattle are slaughtered or made up into products in this state and the products are shipped into the state in a dealer, the law should not be applied to the dealer, but if a firm manufactures outside the state and ships its products into the state, it is entitled to the 5 per cent preferential.

COMMISSION IS APPROVED

Governor Acts in Case of Major Mosherberger, of Woodburn.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 17.—(Special.)—Governor Withycombe today approved the appointment by Colonel McLaughlin, Oregon National Guard, of Captain Major in the Third Infantry, Oregon National Guard. The appointment was also approved by George A. White, Adjutant-General.

In Colonel McLaughlin's request for the appointment, he lists Captain Mosherberger's military record as follows: Served in Company H, Second Oregon Infantry, from 1895 to beginning of the Spanish-American War. Served with Company M, Second United States Volunteer Infantry, during the Philippine insurrection. Commissioned Second Lieutenant December 13, 1902, First Lieutenant May 25, 1904, Captain July 25, 1910.

More than 100 bottles of beer and about one-fourth dozen whisky flasks of whisky were emptied.

VILLA CHIEFTAINS
URGE END OF WAR

Elimination of Leader With View to Surrender Said to Be Intention.

WIFE ALSO IS FOR PEACE

Employes of Pearson Syndicate Are Held as Hostages for Debts of Concern—Destruction of Property Is Feared.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Border advices to the Mexican Embassy here today said that the Villa chieftains had announced an intention "to eliminate Francisco Villa forthwith, with a view to their own immediate surrender to the constitutionalist government."

EL PASO, Tex., Dec. 17.—The proceedings of the Villa council of war at Chihuahua City, reported in conference by arrivals from the capital last night, was the dominating note in the Mexican situation here today. The proceedings of the council are held secret.

Wife Said to Urge Flight. Persons in the confidence of the Villa family of Juarez said today that Senora Luz Carral de Villa, wife of General Francisco Villa, who is at the capital, is endeavoring to persuade General Villa to resign his command and cross the border.

Representatives of the Madera Company, Ltd., of the Pearson syndicate, these employes are held as hostages for the alleged non-payment of wages to Mexican workmen, were informed today that the American syndicate employes arrived yesterday at Chihuahua as prisoners of General Villa. Arrivals from Chihuahua City last night had reported when they left the city on Tuesday only three were held prisoners at Guerrero, near Madera. The information today accounted for the remaining 17, who escaped to the woods and had evidently been captured.

Mining Property in Danger. The representatives of the Pearson Company have until tomorrow to meet the debts, estimated at \$5,000,000, under threat of destruction of property, cannot be met, the local representatives say.

Their demands according to Juarez officials, was based on a loan of \$1,500,000 pesos by Villa to the Pearson Company when Villa paper currency was quoted at 100 pesos for the dollar of burned bridges. One million pesos were used for repairs. Villa now demands the return of the entire loan in gold or silver, and the original rate of exchange, although the Villa paper currency is now worthless. Until a compromise is reached Villa may execute the threat of his army of destroying Pearson properties in Chihuahua representing millions of dollars.

TACOMA IS AFTER MEN

BURGULARIES ARE LAID TO PRISONERS HELD IN PORTLAND. Sound City Will Serve Warrants Should Local Charge Fail to Secure Conviction.

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 17.—(Special.)—Two alleged burglars under arrest in Portland will be brought to Tacoma if not convicted in the former city. John Ryan, who broke into the home of Mrs. H. Stevens, early this morning, and Helen, 3, little daughters of the Stevens, were held under arrest in Portland with John Raymond, pending investigation by the grand jury.

Ryan is said here to be connected with entering Villa Tacoma homes. Ryan is said to be the burglar who, in the Stevens' home, threatened to shoot the children if they made an outcry. Ryan told his attorney, "Faps will get you if you don't go away and leave us alone."

Tacoma police will get warrants for the return of the two men if they are not found guilty of burglary in Portland. They are alleged to have burglarized the residences of U. E. Harmon, attorney of Rev. H. B. Hendley, 3704 South Yakima avenue, and a patient in the hospital, and the residence of D. B. Bunker, 1435 South Warner street, November 13, and an Asotin street residence.

Last night Mr. Hardin attended a Portland moving picture theater, and the evolution of the moving picture came to mind when Chevalier was flashed on the screen in a modern picture play.

"It all came back to me," said Mr. Hardin last night, "remember seeing the first moving picture the same evening with the appearance of Chevalier. It was the performance which stamped the moving picture success on the program announcing the trial picture yet."

BANK CASHIER IS SUICIDE

George F. Herr, of San Francisco, Shoots Himself.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 17.—George F. Herr, assistant cashier of the Anglo & London-Paris National Bank of this city, killed himself tonight by sending a bullet through his head. Herr, who had been confined to his apartments here, suffering from nervous breakdown, escaped from his nurse and shot himself while the nurse and Mrs. Herr were trying to break into the bathroom where he had locked himself in.

FERRIS BILL IN COMMITTEE

Mr. Sinnott Is to Press Amendment to Measure.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU. WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The House public lands committee today began consideration of the Ferris water power bill, but made little progress.

Representative Sinnott, of Oregon, told Chairman Ferris that he intended to press an amendment materially reducing the charge the Government may make under his bill for power privileges, contending that the Government is entitled to no greater charge than actually is necessary to meet the cost of administration.

The question was not settled, but the Democratic majority of the committee is opposed to any material changes in the bill, and the Sinnott proposal probably will be voted down.

INSURANCE AWARD RAISED

Court Holds Aid Extended Parents of Industrial Victim Too Small.

DALLAS, Or., Dec. 17.—(Special.)—Judge Bell, of the Circuit Court, yesterday handed down a decision that marks a precedent in this state, overruling an award made by the State Industrial Accident Commission. H. J. Moore, a logger, was accidentally killed in a logging camp at Black Rock some time ago. The Commission made an award of \$10 per month to the support of the widow, William R. and Anna A. Moore, of West Salem.

Not being satisfied with this, they appealed to the Circuit Court of Polk County for a new award. Judge Bell held that the award was too small and increased it to \$20 per month.

WOMAN ARRESTS VAGRANT

Mrs. Earl Gillanders, of Pendleton, Marches Intruder to Station.

PENDLETON, Or., Dec. 17.—(Special.)—Mrs. Earl Gillanders, a prominent business woman, marched a vagrant to the home of Chief of Police Alex Manning Wednesday and turned him over to the chief. Mrs. Gillanders heard a noise on her front porch in the evening and found two men standing at the open door. One of the men took flight and escaped, but Haw was captured by the vagrant woman.

MRS. HAZZARD PAROLED

Fasting Specialist Soon to Complete Two-Year Term in Prison.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 17.—(Special.)—The State Prison Board at Walla Walla today granted parole to Mrs. Linda Burfield Hazzard, fasting specialist, to become effective December 26, upon the completion of the two-year minimum of her manslaughter sentence.

Mrs. Hazzard was given a two to 20-year sentence, following the death of a child, after she refused to feed the child at the Hazard sanitarium at Ollaha in 1911, after three months almost total absence from food at the direction of the practitioner.

CHARGES NOW DENIED

ALLEGED EMBREZZLER TALKS WITH EASTON POLICE CHIEF.

Pennsylvania Officer Says Father of C. E. Sittler Made Restitution Offer, which Was Rejected.

Clinton E. Sittler, former Tax Collector of the Borough of Tamaqua, Pa., denied all knowledge of his alleged embezzlement from that borough in a talk last night with Chief of Police H. E. Ehrig, Chief of Police of Tamaqua, who is in Portland to take Sittler back to Pennsylvania for trial. Mr. Ehrig says Sittler's embezzlements amount to about \$18,000.

Sittler was arrested several days ago by Manager Alkus, of the Burns International Detective Agency, and Detectives Royle and Tichenor, of the city bureau. After his arrest Sittler freely admitted the charges, and said he was ready to go back to Pennsylvania for trial.

Chief Ehrig says that Sittler is the son of Wallace Sittler, a lumber dealer in Tamaqua. The chief says that the elder Sittler was a considerable political power before his son ran away, but that the father is now "down and out" politically.

Chief Ehrig says that the elder Sittler has property worth about \$18,000 or \$20,000, and that it would take practically his whole fortune to make good his son's shortage.

The elder Sittler, according to the chief, is unwilling to sacrifice his whole fortune in his son's behalf. Mr. Sittler, Ehrig says, proposed to pay back \$6000 of the money and to take over the tax collecting for \$25 a month. He offered the chief says, to pay to the county the difference between \$125 a month and the \$4000 a year which the Tax Collector formerly received. Mr. Ehrig says this offer was refused.

TWO WEIGHTS PROBABLE

Recent Drugstore Inspection Proves Only 1 in 26 Found Correct.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 17.—(Special.)—All pharmacists will be required to have two sets of weights, one in the apothecary system and another in the metric system, under the Oregon State Board of Pharmacy follows the suggestion of Fred Buchtel, deputy sealer of weights and measures. Following an inspection by the Pharmacy Board of druggists in the metric system of measurement were made by the druggist using apothecary weights and vice versa. Frank S. Ward, treasurer of the Pharmacy Board, reported the result of his findings to the board, who has instructed his deputies to inspect drug stores here.
