# ALREADY, IS REPORT

PEACE PACT SIGNED

Baseball Man Says Feds Will Retain Players and Repay Backers From Sales.

70 MEN UNDER CONTRACT

Ban Johnson Declares Peace Is Sure to Come-Wards to Be Reimbursed for Loss of Brooklyn Baseball Plant.

CHICAGO, Dec. 19 .- That a baseball pact was actually signed and sealed last week and that only the details remain to be worked out at the meeting between the National Commission and representatives of the Federal League in Cincinnati Tuesday, was the state-ment made here today by a man who is financially interested in the peace

According to his statement it was agreed at the New York meeting that the Federal League would retain all its players, reimburse its backers from their sale to clubs in organized base-ball, and that the American and Na-tional Leagues would reimburse the Wards, of Brooklyn, for their outlay, the Federals, on their part, agreeing to withdraw from the field.
