HOLGATE STREET IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY. I. N. Day, manager of the Oregon Independent Telephone Company, wants the city to urge the completion of Holgate street by the erection of the viaduct over the tracks of the Oregon Pacific Railway, so the company may get its pay for its work on that street. The company paved portions of the street two years ago between Milwaukee and East Twenty-third streets, but the viaduct, some 200 feet long, has not been erected. The railroad is ready now to proceed with the erection of the viaduct, as soon as the city makes an assessment for abutments for the viaduct. The company did the paving two years ago, but never has been paid and is tired of the long wait. The viaduct likely will be erected next March, as it will take about that time to secure the iron for the structure, which has been ordered.

COLONEL MARTIN TELLS OF MEXICO.—Colonel Charles H. Martin, formerly Colonel of the Third Regiment, Oregon National Guard, and who has but recently returned from the Mexican border, where he served in the Eighteenth United States Infantry, Wednesday night told the members of the officers' school of the Oregon National Guard that the people along the Mexican border think the Carranza regime will be successful. He also said that the Mexican question was in his opinion, coming to a definite settlement. He said he had met and conversed with General Villa and characterized that rebel chieftain as being "the bravest man in Mexico."

EMBARGO IS LIFTED.—The embargo on grain and grain products to San Francisco has been lifted in effect on the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway for the past six weeks, due to a congestion of traffic on its lines, was lifted yesterday by Traffic and Freight departments of that company. He declared that the congestion has been cleared up to such an extent that all points on the system may now receive grain and grain products from San Francisco, in connection with the Great Northern Pacific Steamship Company.

CITY DENIES LAWSUIT.—Sighting a lawsuit threatening the proposed extension of Hillside boulevard between Linnton and Portland, the City Council yesterday instructed the city engineer, of all legal proceedings in the contract so as to wipe the slate of all irregularities.
