of Alaska and Hawaii, where they are urgently needed." As emphasizing the importance of liberal appropriations for coast survey work, Dr. Jones says: "It can be stated here that the ever-

increasing demands for new hydro-graphic surveys due to the increased size, draft and speed of ships of commerce and of war, together with the constant changes along the sandy shores, are already overtaxing the forces and equipment of the coast survey. Now that submersible war vessels, with their requirements of fairly accurate knowledge of depths of 100 feet and more, form an essential part of the National defense, the necessity for new surveys and resurveys is more pressing and vital to the best interests of the country."
