MEASURE FOR LAND LOANS COMPLETED

Bill to Be Submitted to Joint Congressional Committee Next Monday.

FORECAST

Adminstration Is Expected to Support Plan Providing Regional Banks, Financed by Subscriptions From Public.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 -- A land loan till, which is expected to have the approval of the Administration, was co pleted today by a sub-committee of the joint congressional committee on rural credits. Senator Hollis was au thorised to present the measure to the full committee on January 3. Already It has been informally approved by practically the entire membership of the committee.

The bill would provide a comprebenaive farm credits system under the control and supervision of a Federal land bank hoard of five members, to be appointed by the President, with the approval of the Senate. The country would be divided into 12 districts, each with a regional land bank having a capital stock of \$500,000, to be issued in \$19 shares for purchase by the public. Any such stock not taken within to days by private capital or by a local loan organization contemplated by the bill would be subscribed by the Federal Government

Business would be transacted directly between the regional banks and the local bodies which farmers would be authorized to organize in the form of co-operative loan associations or joint stock banks, charters for which wou be passed on by the land bank board.

Interest Beduction Provided. Applications for loans approved by the local organizations would be recommended to the regional bank of the district. The banks would be author-ted to loan out capital stock or to sell bonds to obtain sufficient funds to make the loans, and the farmers would be charged as interest the interest on the bonds plus I per cent. To reduce the rate of interest on the bonds, the bill will provide they must be acceptable by the banks as security for the deposit of public funds.

They would appraise the land on which a farmer sought to obtain money and would themselves become liability for the lean. Thus the bonds would be backed by the regional banks, the local association, the berrowing farmer and a mortrage on the land, given to the association.

Military Leader Under Dr. Sun Heads Revolution in Yunnan Province.

30,000 TROOPS ARE SENT

Government Forces Will Require Weeks to Reach Affected District-Indications of Unrest Are Widespread.

PEKIN, China, Dec. 24.—A revolu-tionary movement under the leader-ship of Tsai Ac, formerly Military-The Chile government has broken out. The Chile government has sent 30,-369 soldiers to queli the revolt. The troops have been sent from Suc-The troope have been sent from Sze-Chuen Province in Western Chins, bordering on Tibet. The uprising started at Yuan Nan Fu, in Yunnan Province. Tsai Ao recently resigned a bureau chiefship at Pekin, alleging his health had failed. He returned secretly to Yunnan, where he had been the most prominent leader under Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the first provisional President of China, who of late is reported to have been conducting revolutionary propagands.

Troops Two Weeks Away. It will require about two weeks of marching through the mountains for the troops from Sze-Chuen Province to reach Yunnan.

Announcement from Pekin of the outbreak of a revolutionary movement in Yunnan Province followed shortly the receipt of private reports that five Chinese provinces, including Yunnan, had declared their independence of the rule of Yuan Shi Kai. The other provinces named in the previous reports were Kwang Tung, Kiagsi, Kweichow and Sze-Chuen. It is from the last-named province that the dispatches say troops have been sent into Yunnan, which lies just to the south of Sze-Chuen, and is the southernmost province of China. The area of Yunnan is about 146,000 square miles and it has a population estimated at 12,000,000.

The Chinese government, however, replied to the representations of Japan and the other powers that it was confident of its ability to handle the internal situation sufficiently and no promise was made that the change would not take place, the governments being assured, however, that the mon-archy would not be instituted during

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
