Christmas Baskets Distributed

Final Day of Campaign Is Unprecedented in Stream of Cash Received.

WINTER RELIEF PROVIDED

Late Responses to Pleas for Cold and Hungry Amply Meet Needs of Organization in Caring for Destitute of City.

Yesterday morning the Associated Charities announced the closing day of

Charities announced the closing day of their Christmas relief fund campaign, with a plea that enough money be sent in on that last day at least to bring the total up to \$4000.

There had been up to that time contributions of little more than \$5100.

Last night, when the offices of the Charities closed, they reported a total of \$3572.55, or only \$120.15 less than \$4000.

Such was the response of the generous people of Portland to the appeal of the poor, sent out to them through the Associated Charities.

Early in the campaign it was feared that the fund would never reach a point where it would be sufficient to maintain the relief work of the organization throughout the Winter.

The actual needs to carry on the work are far more than \$4000, and at that time it looked as though the Charities would be doing well to get \$2000 out of its campaign.

Then, about a week ago, the people began to respond, and the donations began to pour in increasingly.

Yesterday the stream of checks and cash donations became a verifiable flood, and hundreds of deliars were precipitated into the office of the Charities.

It is probable that the contributions that will come in today and for the next few days will bring the fund up considerably above the \$4000 mark, and the remainder of the amount necessary to carry on the work through the Winter will be raised by personal canvass or other methods.

While donations to the fund were officeding the office yesterday, the whole office force of the Charities was at work handling the Christmas bundles for the poor under its care. The majority of the Christmas dinners for the pear in the city were handled by the Muts this year, but the Charities sent out yesterday 100 baskets to poor families, besides waron loads of clothing supplies, toys and Christmas dainties. The response of the people of Portland to our plea for the Christmas relief fund means that the Christmas spirit, which they have made it possible for us to conserve, will spread out inrough the long months of the Winter and bring comfort and happiness to hundreds of poor people, even after the givers have forgotten that they gave a gift to the fund.
