Provision for Use and Disposition of Lands Also Desired by Interior

Department and Rallway.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washngton, Dec. 29 .- Congress is to be asked this Winter to pass some law defining specifically the status of lands granted to the Northern Pacific and other railroads for right of way purposes, and providing specifically for the use and disposition of such lands. Within the last ten days the Supreme Court, in the Concannon case, in the State of Washington, held that the Northern Pacific was without power Northern Facinc was without power to convey title to lands within its right, of way.
