WASTE OF MONEY CHARGED

Assertion Is Made That Criminals Seek Haven in Portland-Immediate Reopening of Kelly Butte Is Called For.

Vigorously condemning the life of sloth and ease afforded prisoners at the County Jall, and recommending the immediate opening of the reckpile at Kelly Butte, the Mulinomah County grand Jury yesterday made its final report of the Fall term, after a record session of 57 days.

After reporting finding in the County Jall numbers of prisoners "who are doing nothing except to live comfertably, well fed and taken care of," the grand Jury's report says:

"We believe that a number of men commit crime for which they are in danger of a jall sentence because they know that even if caught they will not be sent to the reckpile, and that instead they will have a very comfortable existence without trouble to themselves or work.

"We cannot too strongly condemn
this present existing policy, which is
wastiful of the county's money in the
extreme, and is not conducive to the
prevention of crime. We feel that the
moral and financial interest of the citisens and taxpayers of the County of
