

KENTUCKY KICK IS FOR LAY DELEGATES

Democrats Advise Corps of Office-Holders to Give Other Boys a Chance.

FOUR GET INDORSEMENT

Suggestion That Jackson Club Has Trouble Because Its Affairs Are Run by Politicians and Women Is Ruled Out.

Chimes now the Kentucky Kick, an organization of the Democratic faithful and unfrightened, with the pointed suggestion that Federal office holders kindly keep out of the scramble for delegates to the Democratic National convention.

Members of the Kick discussed the situation as to delegates from them to elect and nominate on at a New Year's eve gathering at their headquarters in the Worcester building, the proceedings of which have just come to light.

It was the unanimous view of the meeting that the Honorable Milton A. Miller, Chairman of the Executive Committee, the Honorable Frank M. Myers, President, the Honorable Thomas Carrick Burke, Collector of Customs, the Honorable George H. Chamberlain and Harry Lane, United States Senator, and each and sundry others of the honorable office holding brigade as may feel a call to arms stay right where they are and give some of the nonoffice holders a chance.

Four Indorsements Made. In line with these vigorous sentiments, the kick, after mature deliberation, voted its indorsement of four of the nominees holding boys, who in its opinion meet all the requirements.

The four indorsees are Jefferson Myers, of Portland, and Judge A. H. Bennett, of The Dalles, for delegates-at-large, and Newton McCoy and Alex Swank, both of Portland, for delegates from the Third Congressional District, comprising Multnomah County.

Fraternal Spirit Among Soldiers Wholly Lacking.

MANY RUMORS ARE HEARD

Greece as well as Bulgaria Said to Believe Teutons Will Win War and to Desire Strongly to Be on Winning Side.

British officers to salute Greek officers.

The British lieutenants who failed to do this were reported and were reduced in rank.

One young Irish major was indignant.

"I've been ordered to salute these Greeks. I saluted two or three this morning and they didn't return the salute. I'm through saluting them."

Whether the instigation of friction may be symptomatic of a deeper and more dangerous feeling I don't know. It is natural to presume that some friction is inevitable in such an unnatural and abnormal situation.

The allies are uninvited guests, here under protest, and the Greeks are naturally sore.

There is almost no fraternizing. For days I have looked for signs of that camaraderie which is a natural development when soldiers are together, but I have seen none of it. The Greeks and the British and French and their, and there is no fraternizing.

Rumors Bring Battleships. One hears many rumors. Only last week the British headquarters were talking serious notice of a report that Greece was likely to throw her forces into the war.

Charges for Pedestrians, Motors, Horse-Drawn Vehicles and Livestock Are Named, but Rate for Streetcars Is Postponed.

ALLIES IGNORE CONSUL

REQUEST OF AMERICAN AT SALONIKI IS REFUSED.

Thousand Germans and Austrians Arrested, Including Schoolmaster and Several Women.

BERLIN, Jan. 4.—(By wireless to Cayville, N. Y.)—The Overseas News Agency says:

"According to the Corriere della Sera, of Milan, John E. Kehl, American Consul at Saloniki, who is caring for the interests of Austria, Germany, Bulgaria and Turkey there, has called on the Franco-British authorities to vacate the buildings of the Consulate which have been arrested. Mr. Kehl's request was refused.

"It is also reported that among the other Germans and Austrians arrested at Saloniki, numbering about 1500, are the headmaster of a German school and several women."

PARIS, Jan. 4.—The Ministry of the Interior announces that the Consuls of the Teutonic allies arrested at Saloniki will be brought to Marseilles and from there conducted to the Swiss frontier.

The ministry further announces that in reprisal for the arrest by the Bulgarian authorities of the French Vice-Consul and the charge-d'affaires at Sofia and the seizure of the archives of the legation, the government today caused the arrest of the Bulgarian official in charge of the archives at the Bulgarian legation in Paris.

As this official is ill, however, he was allowed to remain in his room but under guard of a sentry.

Person. 5 cents. Pedestrian, one person, 5 cents. One person on bicycle, 5 cents. Two persons on one bicycle, 10 cents. Each person riding on an animal or upon any vehicle capable of carrying 25 persons or less, 5 cents. Each person riding upon a vehicle capable of carrying more than 25 persons, 5 cents.

Self-Propelled Vehicles. Motorcycle, 5 cents. Passenger vehicle having seats for two persons (one-seated runabouts), 10 cents. Passenger vehicle having seats for more than two persons, 15 cents. Truck or motor-driven wagon, commonly called one-half ton capacity, 10 cents. Trucks not over one-ton capacity, 10 cents. Trucks over one-ton but not over two-ton capacity, 25 cents. Trucks over two-ton capacity, 50 cents. Wood-hauling machines, 15 cents. Self-propelled tractors used in their own power, not otherwise applied, included.

Vibrations in Earth Are Reported From East to West.

NEWPORT, Or., Jan. 4.—(Special.)—A short, distinct shock, supposed to be an earthquake, was felt here at 10:10 o'clock.

It was felt at Nye Creek and on Front street. Vibrations were from east to west.

The quake was felt all along the coast in this vicinity quite distinctly. County Commissioner Hurt, of Yachats, reports that his store building was shaken severely. Sharp shocks were felt also at Waldport and Tidewater.

At Newport chandeliers were set swinging and crockery rattled on the store shelves. At the home of Paul Black, of this city, a large vase was thrown from the table to the floor and broken. At a drug store packages on the showcase were toppled over.
