The foregoing were a few of the striking opinions uttered today by Miss Jane Addams, president of the International Congress of Women at The Hague and of the Woman's Feace Party of America, in the first interview she has granted since her operation.

Miss Addams repeatedly disavowed responsibility of the Woman's Farty for the Ford ship, but adds words of praise for Mr. Ford and his intentions.

"I will not comment on the wisdom or folly of the peace ship," said Miss Addams. "But it was not related to our movement.
