Florida grape fruit is three for a quarter; those from California three for 15 cents.

Lemons, 18, 15 and 20 cents a dozen. Florida cactus, 50 cents a basket; pomogranates, 5 cents each; cranberries, two pounds for a quarter; bananas, 25 cents a dozen; fancy pineapples, 20 cents each.

Some ground cherries may still be had at two pounds for 15 cents.

Bitter melon, 10 cents a dozen. Florida sweet peas, of fine form, are 50 cents a dozen, but very nice Winter Nellis stock can be had for 15 cents.

Apples from a department by themselves. By the box they range from \$1 to \$2; by the dozen, from 10 to 20 and 40 cents for the large sizes of choice varieties.

Little Lady apples, 1 cent a pound.

Los Angeles is forwarding her new crop of string beans, which, along with green peas and lima beans, retail at 20 cents a pound.

From Southern California also comes new spinach, at two pounds for a quarter, and new tomatoes at 15 cents a basket.

Kagplant, 20 cents; and Brussels sprouts 10 cents a pound; artichokes, two for a quarter; other 5 cents each.

Celery roots, four for a quarter.

Sweet potatoes, three pounds for a dime; Irish, 11.25 a sack and upwards; eight pounds for 10 cents.

Lettuce heads, 5 and 10 cents each; celery, 10 cents a bunch.

Rutabaga, six pounds for a dime; Hubbard squash, 1 cent each.

Hot-house cucumbers, 10 cents; cauliflower, 10 and 15 cents a head.

### AUTO ARRESTS ARE THREAT

Police Declare War Against Cars Without Licenses.

Almost any day, say the police, arrests will begin pouring into the police station for those who have not obtained their 1916 automobile licenses.

According to H. P. Coffin, chairman of the public safety commission, who has been detailed to issue temporary licenses here, but 40 per cent of the owners have their new licenses. He is receiving about 50 applications a day, but there are some 8000 machines in Portland.

The police have been lenient up to this time, giving ample allowance for delays, but very shortly the ax will fall on those who have procrastinated. Temporary licenses are being issued to only those with new cars.
