

RUSSIAN LOSSES IN GALICIA ARE HUGE

Vienna Estimates 50,000 Fell in Battle on Bessarabian Front in One Day.

INTENSITY ON INCREASE

More Than 800,000 Men, With 3500 Cannon, Said to Be Engaged. Effect of Continued Pressure Said to Be Telling.

VIENNA, via London, Jan. 7.—Russian losses on the Bessarabian front in the first day of fighting during the New Year's fighting were at least 50,000, according to the official statement issued by the War Office today. The statement is part follows: Yesterday on the northeast front comparative calm prevailed, fighting occurring only on the sky. The enemy repeated his attacks on the Galla-tina front, but the Russian sharpshooters advanced on our line northeast of Buczacz before daybreak and penetrated our trenches for a short distance. By quick counter attacks we expelled the enemy, capturing numerous prisoners and three machine guns.
