ALASKAN APPROPRIATION UNDER.—The executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce adopted a resolution yesterday urging that the Federal Government make an appropriation of \$2,000,000 for continuation of the work on the Alaskan railroad without interruption. This resolution was adopted at the request from the Senate Chamber of Commerce, which has also made a similar appeal to the Government. Unless funds are made available at once the work must stop at the end of June, which will be the beginning of a new fiscal year.
