

COLDEST DAY IN 7 YEARS MODERATES

Minimum of 18 Degrees Above Followed by Heavy Snow and Warmer Weather.

NORTHWEST IS A-SHIVER

Continued Snow Storm and Strong Wind Are Predicted for Today, Although Temperatures Are Likely to Rise in Valley.

Following the coldest day in seven years, yesterday, the elements moderated slightly early last night and a snow, which promises to assume serious proportions, began falling, bearing out the weather man's prediction for "slightly warmer weather and snow" today.

The official thermometer reached to slightly below 18 degrees above zero yesterday morning at 9 o'clock and the heat the day could bring forth in warm weather was 24 degrees, which was reached at 5 o'clock last night. Immediately afterwards the mercury in the official thermometer dropped four degrees in an hour and at 7 o'clock last night it was 21 degrees above zero and still falling.

The sudden cold spell yesterday morning had been expected since January 1, 1915. The low was general throughout the Pacific Northwest, and in some places the mercury had fallen to zero.

TACOMA IS SET ASHIVER

Frozen Coils in Stove Cause Explosion and Woman Is Hurt.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—Temperature in Tacoma at 7 this morning, according to Weather Bureau thermometer, was 12 degrees above zero, the coldest since January 12, 1915, when the Government thermometer stood at 5.4 degrees above.

There have been only five days in the 18 years recorded at this weather office when the temperature was lower than this morning. In the coldest and the high, serious of the city the temperature was 16 above.

BLIZZARD SWEEPS BIG BEND

Snow Drifts 20 Feet Deep and Branch Trains Canceled.

WENATCHEE, Wash., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—The big Bend country is experiencing one of the worst storms of the winter. A gale is sweeping over the plateau, piling up snow in drifts 20 feet high, blocking all wagon roads.

COLD GRIPS UNION COUNTY

Snow Doesn't Defeat and Rail Traffic Is Not Interfered With.

LA GRANDE, Or., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—Clear, windless cold, that is pushing the mercury down rapidly, prevails in Union County today. While tonight's minimum may not reach the record for three years established last week when a mark of 2 below was registered, the fact remains that today was the coldest in a number of years, 2 above zero.

HOOD RIVER TO SKATE TODAY

HOOD RIVER, Or., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—Hood River people will skate tomorrow. Not daunted by the blanket of a foot of snow that covers the big Columbia Slough just north of the city, a crew of boys and men, having tapped the outlet of the water system of the Apple Growers' Association, have been busy today flooding the surface of the pond.

PENDLETON MERCURY DROPS

Temperature of 8 Above Zero Is Registered in Afternoon.

PENDLETON, Or., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—Last night the temperature dropped to 18 degrees above zero. This afternoon the thermometer registered a 6 degrees above zero, and more cold is expected for tonight.

Chehalis Has Fuel Shortage.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—The coldest weather of the season prevailed here last night and this morning, the thermometer touching a point 11 degrees above zero. Fuel dealers report a big demand for wood and coal supplies. The unusual cold spell of the past two weeks has depleted most private fuel supplies seriously.

Seattle Mercury Below Freezing.

SEATTLE, Jan. 11.—The temperature in Seattle at 3 o'clock was 14 degrees above zero, the lowest since January 12, 1915. A minimum temperature of 11 above zero at Seattle is forecast for tonight. The bright, cold weather will continue through Wednesday.

Have, Mont., Has 24 Below Zero.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 11.—A temperature of 24 degrees below zero was reported to the Weather Bureau from Have, Mont., today. The temperature in Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho was near zero or below. In Spokane 2 above was registered. Prince Albert, Alberta, reported a temperature of 44 degrees below zero.

Walla Walla Coldest in Four Years.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 11.—With the thermometer 2 degrees below zero, Walla Walla is experiencing the coldest weather in four years. Six inches of snow cover the ground and about 20 inches have fallen during the winter, which is one of the most severe in many years.

Ellensburg Has 26 Below Zero.

ELLENSBURG, Wash., Jan. 11.—The coldest weather of several years was experienced here today, when the Government thermometer registered 26 degrees below zero.

Mercury 10 at Centralia.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—L. S. Turner, local weather man, reported this morning that the thermometer last night dropped to its lowest point of the season, 10 degrees.

SURVEY LINK FORMS

Columbia Highway Nearly Mapped, Seaside to Wasco.

ENGINEERS ARE AT WORK

E. J. Cantine Reports Also That Pacific Route in Douglas County Is Completed to Two Miles of Roseburg.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—With the completion of the highway survey from the Deschutes River to the Biggs-Wasco road line, E. J. Cantine, chief deputy engineer for the State Highway department, today advised the highway commission that there would be a continuous survey of the Columbia Highway from Seaside, through Clatsop, Columbia, Hood River, Wasco and Sherman counties to the town of Wasco.

The Deschutes River-Biggs-Wasco survey has been requested by the Sherman County Court and the expense will be borne by that county. The survey between Hood River and Mosier is completed and the highway department engineers are working from The Dalles to the Deschutes River.

In Columbia County, Engineer Cantine advised the commission that the construction work on Rainier Hill has been finished. The total length of the work under construction was 2.18 miles, of which distance 1.13 miles is built to a standard 34-foot width and 1.05 miles to roadbed varying from 18 to 29 feet.

The Pacific Highway in Douglas County is finished to within two miles of Roseburg from the north. The highway department announced that it had been decided to make an alternate location for six miles on a basis of eliminating grade crossings from a point two miles south of Wilbur to two miles south of Oakland. The field work from the Lane County line to Roseburg will be finished within a few days.

Reconnaissance work by highway department engineers on the Pacific Highway indicates that the location of the road from Myrtle Creek to Roseburg will be via Dillard, passing to the opposite side of the river at Myrtle Creek. This, it is said, will eliminate numerous grade crossings and the heavy grade at Roberts Mountain.

LIQUOR AT SPOKANE SEIZED

Search in Hotel Reveals Place in Rafter Prepared for Beer.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 11.—The first seizure in Spokane of liquor since the state-wide prohibition law became effective was made today when policemen with search warrants found 198 bottles of beer secreted in a trunk in a storage house.

The beer, according to Mrs. William Zuber, who with her husband was arrested, had been removed from their hotel. A search of the hotel showed that places between the rafters had been lined with tin, into which had been placed, according to the woman, to place in and bottles of beer.

Mr. Quinlan Buried in Pendleton.

PENDLETON, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Timothy Quinlan, aged 75 years, father of Frank Quinlan, prominent Pendleton man, was buried in Pendleton Tuesday. The deceased was a resident of Pendleton for a number of years before moving to Kootenai, Idaho, six years ago, where he died last Saturday night. He is survived by a widow and four sons—John Quinlan, Timothy Quinlan, Jr., Frank J. Quinlan and a son living in Canada.

MAYOR O. B. HAYDEN DEAD

Tacoma Banker and Resident Since 188 Succumbs to Illness.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—Major O. B. Hayden, resident of Tacoma since 1888, when he came here from Iowa and organized the Citizens' National Bank, died last night at his home here after a protracted illness.

He was born in Indiana in 1842 and served in the Civil War in Company D, Ninth Indiana Cavalry. Major Hayden was widely known in Tacoma and vicinity and gained distinction by being the only banker here to pull his bank safely through the early panic. In 1899 he was appointed postmaster.

Lewis County Funds Apportioned.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Jan. 11.—(Special.)—The Lewis County Commissioners have made the following allowances for clerk and deputy hire in the various county offices for 1916: Auditor, \$400; Treasurer, \$210; Clerk \$150; Assessor, \$210; Assessor's field deputies, \$260; field deputies not to be paid in excess of \$3 a day; Prosecutor, \$150; Sheriff, \$120; engineer, \$150.

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
