

GENERAL HUERTA DEAD AT EL PASO

Ex-Dictator of Mexico Prisoner of United States as Life Comes to End.

MILITARY CAREER LONG

Profession That of Soldier, With Predilection for Scientific Work. Indictment Found on Day Before He Dies.

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—General Victoriano Huerta, former Provisional President of Mexico, died at his home here at 8:33 o'clock tonight.

General Victoriano Huerta, who succeeded General Francisco I. Madero, in executive power in Mexico City, and later left Mexico, died of pneumonia of the liver. He was surrounded by his family and servants when the fatal attack came. Funeral arrangements are to be made tomorrow. It was announced at his residence today. It is believed an effort will be made to arrange for his burial in Mexico.

General Victoriano Huerta was a professional soldier, and as such he had, up to the overthrow of President Francisco Madero, been known for his loyal support of the existing government. He fought loyally for President Porfirio Diaz until his fall, and when Diaz was no longer chief executive Huerta fought for Francisco de la Barra, the Provisional President. After Francisco Madero was elected Huerta found it to be his duty to support one who had so long fought as a rebel. His loyalty was not challenged until the Felix Diaz revolution in Mexico City in February, 1912, when the Madero government was completely overthrown and Huerta himself elevated to the Presidency.

Huerta devoted himself to the military career at an early age. Born at Chihuahua in 1854, he entered the Military Academy of Chihuahua at the age of 17 and passed through the full course to graduation in 1875, when he was commissioned second lieutenant of engineers.

Mexican Staff Huerta's Idea. When Porfirio Diaz began his reorganization of the Mexican army Huerta was promoted to captain of engineers, and while holding this rank devised the plan for a Mexican general staff corps. He was an active member of the military map commission created to draft a staff map of Mexico on a large scale and he had charge of all the astronomical work of the commission.

During the ensuing years Huerta saw much active service. In 1891 he left the staff and took command of the infantry in the campaign against the Yaqui Indians. He participated in subsequent Yaqui campaigns and also in the campaign in Yucatan against the Maya Indians.

Huerta commanded all the detached government forces in the state of Guerrero at the beginning of the Madero revolution. When Madero acceded to the Presidency, General Huerta was sent back into Mexico with a force to put down the Zapata rebellion. As a result of ill-feeling growing out of this campaign Huerta was recalled. Subsequently he led the army sent against Orozco and was in command at the battle of Bachima. For this service he was promoted to Major-General.

Disloyalty to Madero Follows. In the armed Felix Diaz revolution, which resulted in the overthrow of the Madero government, Huerta was called to active command as the senior ranking general. He was captured by the revolutionaries and taken to Chapultepec Castle in the palace on the first of the 10 days' fighting and was placed in entire command of the forces of the government. He directed the government troops during all the subsequent fighting, and the conduct of these operations led to severe criticisms on the part of Madero's friends.

It was charged that he did not carry out the operations with any spirit, that he disobeyed the commands of President Madero, and that before General Blanco entered the city it was this conference which sealed the fate of the Madero.

Huerta was the moving spirit in the plot that resulted in the seizure of the person of President Madero and his brother Gustavo. The assassination of President Madero and his brother, General Blanco, and the mounting Huerta, with the military behind him, had made himself provisional president. General Huerta failed to obtain recognition of his government from the United States and after a turbulent period, in the course of which United States forces occupied Vera Cruz, he abandoned his office and fled to Spain. Later he returned to New York, going from there to the southern boundary, where he was arrested on charges of plotting to overthrow the American government. Since then he had been a prisoner of the United States. He was indicted by a Federal grand jury on Wednesday.

HAY IS SCARCE IN BAKER

Early Spring Hoped For to Relieve Cattle-Feed Situation.

BAKER, Or., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—Scarcity of hay is being reported in several parts of the district. Commissioners have been received from parts of Grant and Malheur counties for some time, but Baker County is now hoping that an early spring will relieve the situation.

In Lower Powder Valley there is hardly enough to feed the cattle, while in Eagle Valley the situation is such that \$12 a ton finds ready buyers. It is expected the price will go much higher before the cold weather abates. The long dry season gave only a partial crop, and the early winter caused feeding much earlier than usual, and the combination has caused the scarcity.

TWO IN ABERDEEN RACE

Nine Positions, However, Are to Be Filled at City Election.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—When the first week of filings for city jobs ended here tonight only two candidates had appeared for the nine positions opened. These candidates are F. E. Clark for City Clerk and T. H. Hill for City Treasurer. Both are standing for re-election. No one has appeared for a Council position or for Police Judge.

The fact that all filings must be made before the coming commission government election is held is killing all interest in the municipal primary. None of the six Councilmen whose terms expire in March will make any statement concerning whether they will seek re-election.

SONORA IS DISQUIETED

MILITARY GOVERNOR AND GENERAL ARE NEAR BREAK. Troops Discontented Over Depreciation in Carranza Currency, in Which They Are Paid.
