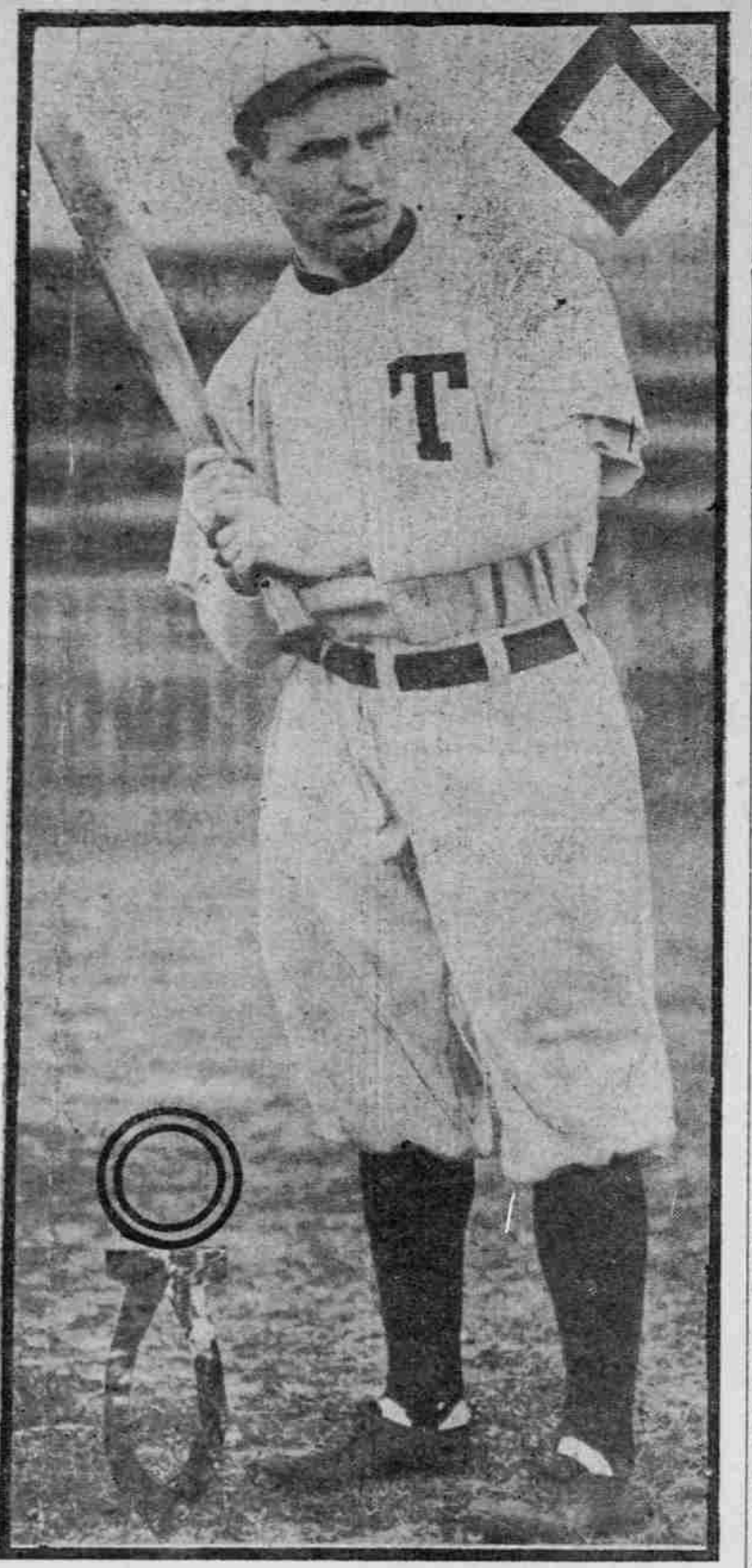
Brooklyn Releases Chabek and Zimmerman to Commuters.

Outfielder Is Declared One of Best Ever Sent West.
