Chaplin's contract with Essanay was ended January 21, it is said that the Chaplin released, and they have at least two stored away, a proceeding which does not speak well of the company's general intention of retaining his services at any cost.

Mack Bennett, while believing that the \$500-a-week Essanay Arbuckle can be made into a good drawing-card as Chaplin, would like to have Charlie for the Keystone squad, and it is said that the studio is ready to make weekly. Chaplin asks for less than that a week, but wants \$250,000 in Keystone stock and a percentage of the profits of the "Chaplin" releases.

Subscriptions for Day Exceed \$1000.

THREE GIVE \$100 EACH

Several Churches Send in Sunday Offerings and Laymen's Missionary Conference Committee Gets \$75 by Passing the Hat.

More than \$1000 in cash and checks was added to the now rapidly growing Jewish relief fund yesterday. It was one of the busiest days Ben Selling, treasurer of the fund, has had since the campaign was inaugurated, and both he and the members of the general committee feel gratified over the way the subscriptions have been mounting upward in the last day or two.

Three individual donations of \$100 each were received during the day, one from Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie, another from Dr. Andrew C. Smith and the third from the Terminal Ice & Cold Storage Company. Three contributions of \$50 each were also among the big batches of checks that came in during the course of the day, while scores and scores of smaller checks and offerings of cash came in from local donors and from half a dozen cities and towns throughout the state.

BERRY GROWERS UNITE

KENNEWICK AND RICHLAND ORGANIZING MARKETING AGENCY.

All Produce to Go Through Single Channel Controlling Output and Remedying Defects.

KENNEWICK, Wash., Jan. 31.—(Special).—Strawberry growers of this section and the Richland district, representing 300 acres, or 85 per cent of the total acreage, in a public meeting here today, voted to sell this year's crop through one channel. A committee composed of M. N. Hudnall, W. P. Osgood, H. C. Puderbaugh, F. H. Krug, J. Ross and E. A. Gray, were appointed to work with a like committee from the Richland district to draw up the articles of incorporation and work out the details of the proposed cooperative marketing campaign.
