### Prize May Seek Haven.

This article permits prizes to be brought into a neutral part on account of unasawarthiness, stress of weather or want of fusi or provisions. A prize must leave as soon as the circum-stances which justified its entry are at an end. If it does not, the neutral power must order it to leave at once; sheuld it fail to uber, the meutral

prever must order it to have at once; should it fail to obey, the neutral prever must employ the means at its disposal to release it with its officers and crew and to<sup>2</sup>interne the prize crew. A subsequent article enlarges the power of the captor of a prize so that he may bring the captured vessel into a neutral nert "to be sequestered pend-ing the decision of a prize court." ### STATISTICS CONCERNING VESSELS CAPTURED OR DESTROYED IN RECENT GERMAN SEA RAID.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 .- The South African liner Appam, captured WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The Bouth Atrican timer Appant, cartered in the Germany' latest sea raid on commerce, is of 751 tons gross. She was built in 1913 at Belfast, Ireland, and was owned by the Brit-ish and African Steam Navigation Company, which is under the man-agement of the Eder Dempster line. The latest maritime records show the steamer Trader was a Brit-

ish vessel of 2127 tons, and her intest reported voyage was from Callao to Queenstown. She was last reported as having arrived at Montevideo December 4.

The Corbridge was a British collier of 2222 tons and was last re-orted as having arrived at Barry December 22 from Nantes. France, he undoubtedly had left Barry on another voyage when sunk by the

Germans. The Advindne was a British steamer of 1925 tons, last reported sailing from Buenos Aires December 21 for Las Palmas. The Dromonby, a British collier of 2322 tons, was last reported sailing from the Clyde for the Bristol Channel December 25. The vessel probably had taken on coal and was bound to some South European port when sunk by the Germans. The steamer Farringford was a British vessel of 1993 tons, whose
