

CARS RUNNING ON NEARLY ALL LINES

With 2000 Extra Men Tracks Are Cleared Despite Handicap From Motor Traffic.

JITNEYS PROFIT BY RUSE

Trolley Patrons Indignant Because Efforts to Restore Service Are Thwarted by Auto Drivers, Making Thousands Walk.

By employing more than 2000 extra men yesterday the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company succeeded in restoring service on most of its city lines.

By late yesterday direct communication had been re-established with almost every part of the city.

Only the remote districts have not been provided with service. The company is hopeful of opening those sections today.

Work Often Endless. At scores of places after the workmen employed by the company had cleared the tracks for the operation of cars, heavily-laden trucks would come along, one set of wheels on one rail and the other set on the other.

Numerous complaints also were made yesterday by streetcar patrons against jitney drivers and other autoists who were reported to be blocking the way.

Jitneys Raise Rates. Jitney operators, it was reported, also removed their signs and replaced them with "for hire" cards.

City Takes Action to Get Streets Cleared Up. The city council yesterday decided to go to the hat and try to open up the streets.

MR. BAKER TAKES CHARGE. The business men's delegation, headed by Julius L. Meier and W. F. Woodward, called a meeting of the Council at the Portland Hotel to discuss the proposition.

One thousand men employed by the city, as well as the hundreds engaged by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, are now hard at work trying to open up streetcar traffic and merchandise deliveries in the residence districts.

Two hours afterward more than 500 men assembled at Stark and Broadway ready to go to work.

Each automobile carried, besides mail, three or four husky clerks armed with shovels.

At least one delivery is promised today. The only mail not being delivered now is big parcels, and a parcel has to be of pretty good size to be held out.

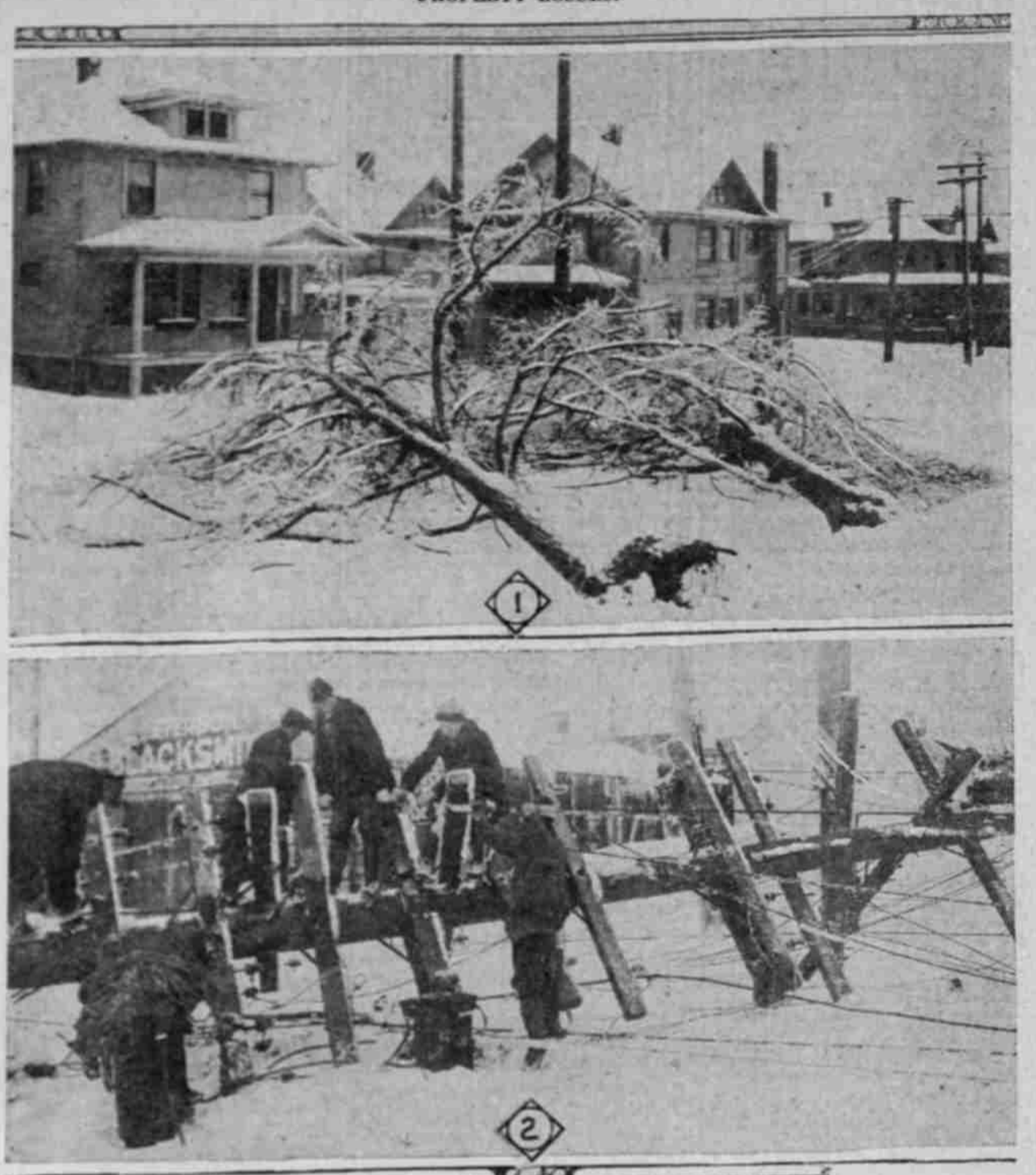
