CORVALLIS, Or., Feb. 6,-(Special.)transfer has been completed in Ben on County whereby the Charles K Spaulding interests become the owners of \$5,000,000 feet of standing timber and a logging railroad running to the

oige of the property. The legging railroad was formerly owned by the Mary's River Timber Company, and much of the timber was the property of the Alsea Louging Company, of which William Noon was a large stockholder. The new owners will be known under the name of

Mary's River Logging Company. The timber purchased by the Spauldng people lies about 15 miles west by suth of Corvallis, in the vicinity of Mary's Mountain. The legging road extends from Noon Station on the Curvallis & Eastern Rallroad three miles west of Philemath, to the head of Woods Creek. The timber lies mostly wouth from the end of the present line of railroad, in the direction of Alsea, and will be reached by the railroad as soon as the weather will permit the work to be carried on.

By arrangement with the Southern Pacific Company the logging company will ship logs to the two Spaulding be early in the Spring.

The origin of the fire, which started near a stove in the confectionery store and billiard hall of Vogt Bros., is unknown. The area of the burned district covers an entire block.

Eugene Asked for Ald.

A. C. Dixon, manager of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, and people from Eugene owning property in Coburg, made hurried trips across country to the town over roads covered in places by flood waters which the machines were compelled to ford and which have been almost closed to traffice by the high water. The Eugene fire department was called upon for assistance, but did not respond, so


