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CITY PAYS OUT \$12,000

COST OF ALL MUNICIPAL WORK IN RECENT STORMS ESTIMATED. Extra Crews Laid Off and Only Regular Men Now Employed Keeping Catch Basins Open.

ALTHOUGH AN EXACT TABULATION OF THE total cost to the city of clearing streets and street lines during the storm has not been made, figures compiled by City Treasurer Adams show that the cost will be less than \$10,000. This amount will cover the cost of all the work done during last week, including the removal of snow from the business district. Counting the work done during the storm of two weeks ago, the total cost will be a little more than \$12,000.

WATER PLANT SALE IS UP. Milwaukee Council Is to Consider Offer Tomorrow Night. The Milwaukee City Council will meet tomorrow night to consider the offer of the Milwaukee Water Company to sell its plant to the city for \$4500 as a compromise measure, with the promise that all litigation shall cease if the offer is accepted.

MILK DELIVERIES RESUMED. Reopening of Interurban Transportation Lines Provides Supply. Milk conditions in the city were greatly relieved yesterday by the opening up of interurban electric lines and the establishment of train service. Dealers attempted for the first time to make general deliveries all over the city. The shortage of milk which has existed during the storm, was relieved and the prospects are that conditions will be normal within a day or two.

BUILDING CODE TO STAND. PROPOSED ATTACK ON ROOF REQUIREMENTS UPSET BY SNOW. Prior to the storm Building Inspector Plummer heard that some of the building interests were planning a campaign against the provision of the city ordinance requiring that the roofs of buildings be stressed so as to carry a load of not less than 40 pounds to the square foot. The storm, Mr. Plummer says, and the consequent collapse of some of the roofs and the straining of others has put a quietus on the proposed campaign.

TROLLEY WIRE BUYER HELD. JUNK DEALER ACCUSED OF ACCEPTING PROPERTY HE KNEW WAS STOLEN. Solomon Parnes, junk dealer at Front and Madison streets, was arrested Saturday on an indictment returned by the grand jury charging him with receiving stolen property. He is accused on November 29 of buying \$900 pounds of trolley wire which he knew had been stolen from the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. The wire was valued at \$160. Special Agent Lou Wagner, of the Railway Company, maintains that Parnes confessed to receiving this stolen wire and later repudiated his confession and refused to identify the alleged thieves at the trial, when he had picked them out from among dozens of prisoners several weeks before. Bail was fixed at \$500 cash.
