

## BATHING SUITS QUIT 3 INCHES FROM HIPS

Bare Legs and Arms and Decollete Neck, Skin-Tight Jersey New Mode.

### WAIST LINE IS ELEVATED

Soft, Flowing Lines, Draped Effects, Old-Fashioned Folds, Falling Laces, Ruffles, Etc., Are Favored in Spring Styles.

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—(Special)—Bathing beach policemen may face nervous presentation this summer trying to keep bathing suits within the limits of the law as to measurements.

"Three inches above the knee" is supposed to be the official edict, but the beach tags measure will have to be doctored to make it behave, for both shorts being exhibited at the Fashion Show at the Auditorium are not more than three inches below the hip.

"Another thing is the adoption of the jersey. This means a skin-tight garment with a little skirt as a cover. But bare legs, no sleeves and a decollete neck accompany the jersey."

**Skirts to Be Short.**  
Short, flowing line draped effects, dainty, old-fashioned folds, quaint streamers, huge, billowing skirts, are indicated by the models representing what women will wear this spring.

The dictum has gone forth that skirts for smart functions definitely will be made from fabrics from the floor. And the width will be from five to 12 yards. Fullness over the hips will continue, and feather-boning exaggerate the flare of the skirt.

Colors for evening and chic afternoons affairs will be bright, the favorites being combinations of roses, scarlets, emeralds, much liked being "peacock gray." Silver and gold cloths are much used in combinations.

**Gorgeous Crepe Favorite.**  
Gorgeous crepe is a prime favorite, and, according to F. Mitchell, president of the Chicago Garment Manufacturers' Association, the American crepe is more durable and substantial than the foreign crepe.

The top cost for outfitting the outfit is \$100, the fabrics and the fibers are full, the favorite fabric being corduroy, gingham, white chinchilla, chenille satin striped novelties, race-meet cords (with a stripe not so heavy as corduroy), blazer striped velvets, tooled leather and duvety.

### GERMAN CONSULS INDICTED

Colonel General was voted in connection with the use of the steamer Sacramento to supply German ships of war in the South Pacific, which ended in the internment of that vessel by the Chilean government many months ago.

According to officials here, the Sacramento case is one of the clearest that has come to their notice of the use of an American port as a base of supplies for belligerent warships and of false clearance papers to get the supply ship past the customs authorities.

### 22 INDICTMENTS ARE FOUND

Bopp and Von Schack Accused of Bomb Plots in Five Cases.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 8.—News from Washington of the voted indictments of high civilian officials of the German consulate here anticipated by all here that the trial would be delayed from the Federal grand jury. Officials admitted, in the light of dispatches, that among those against whom indictments have been voted are included the following:

Frank Bopp, Consul-General for Germany.

Baron E. H. Von Schack, Vice-Consul-General for Germany.

Henry W. Kaufmann, chancellor of the German Consulate.

Maurice H. Hall, Consul-General for Turkey.

W. J. Johnson, former owner of the steamer Manzanita.

Johannes H. Van Koelbergen, alleged agent of the German Consulate.

Dr. Simon Reimer, said to be a German navy officer.

John Williams, thought to be a Scot, Scottish name.

There were in all 42 indictments voted charging violations of neutrality. Five having to do with bomb plotting included the names of Bopp and Von Schack.

It will be returned on Thursday in all, it was said by W. Preston, United States Attorney, 19 indictments, and 27 of those, it was said, were against immigration inspectors and officials, officers of steamers and Chinese in connection with the smuggling of Chinese.

The other three bomb plot indictments are new charges against Baron George Wilhelm Von Brincken, an attaché of the German Consulate; C. G.

Crowley, a detective, and Mrs. Margaret Cornell, an investigator, who, with Crowley, was hired by Bopp according to the charges. These three are held under indictment on charges with concern in the plot to assassinate and to use the mails to incite to murder, arson and assassination.

It was said by Mr. Preston tonight that in the new indictments these charges have been supplanted by allegations said to have been voted against Baron Von Schack of violation of the Sherman anti-trust law and conspiring to send a military expedition from the United States.

It is alleged by the Government that agents of the German Consulate intended to carry on the destruction of the United States bridges to such an extent that their operations would come under the head of those of a military expedition. Von Koelbergen is said to be one of these agents.

Alleged violation of the anti-trust law had to do with restrictions of foreign commerce, whereas the Government charges Bopp, Von Schack, Crowley, Cornell and Von Brincken attempted to effect.

Baron Von Schack, Preston said, also figures in the indictments in the sacramental Massalian Olson & Massalian, unusual shipping cases.

Preston said that the 27 individuals and firms involved are included in this instance in a voted indictment alleging general conspiracy to defraud the Government. About 18 individuals and firms indicted months ago in connection with the Sacramento case are also remanded to stand trial.

It is in connection with the alleged purchase, shipment and discharge to German cruisers in Chilean waters by the steamship *Manzanita*.

Hall is said to have been indicted. Preston said he signed the checks for the purchase of the cargo of the *Sacramento*.

Dr. Reimer, address unknown, and "Frederick Williams" are also thought to be connected with the plot.

Baron Von Schack, alleged defendant under this head was said to be in connection with the carrying of coal by the steamer *Massalian* from San Francisco to Guaymas for German warships in the Fall of 1914. Jensen owned the vessel.

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An appropriation of \$11,000,000 is carried by the bill for purchase or construction of a Government plant with an annual output of not less than 30,000 tons. That is little more than would be required for first-class battleships. The plant would leave a large part of the armor needed in the Navy's increased building programme to come from private plants.
