Ceremony at Start of Work on Auditorium to Be Monday.

PROGRAMME WILL BE BRIEF

Maidens Representing Portland Organizations Will Officiate and Police Band and City Officials Will Take Part.

A body of pretty girls will officiate next Monday when the first shovel of ground will be removed from the site of Portland's new \$100,000 auditorium, at Third and Market streets.

This arrangement was made yesterday at a conference between city officials and representatives of various civic organizations of the city at the Chamber of Commerce.

In addition to the inspiring activities of this corps of attractive maidens, the occasion will be made memorable by the presence of the Police band, the full staff of city officials and old General Public and most of his family.

Final arrangements for the ceremonies next Monday were made at an informal meeting at the Chamber of Commerce yesterday.
