SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Despite the protests of the Multnomah Athletic Club officials, the Spokane Amateur Athletic Club will use Frank Glaze in the interclub boxing and wrestling meet tomorrow according to Harry S. Burdick, president of the local club.

REGISTRATION BODY ACTS

Chairman of Committee Shoulders Responsibility for Protest.

Edgar E. Frank, chairman of the registration committee of the Pacific Northwest Amateur Association, which office is held by the Multnomah Athletic Club, that is protesting against the competition of Frank Glaze, but it is the registration committee.

"It is not the idea of the registration committee to bar athletes of the Glaze type, for every member wants to see these kind of amateurs in the ranks. We are merely enforcing the rules, the Pacific Northwest Amateur Association rules state very plainly that if any amateur competes on the same team as a professional, whether he receives money or not, he is to be classified as a professional."

"I have at my office correspondence from B. H. Hall, member of the registration committee in Spokane, who he stated before Glaze competed in the professional bouts, that he had advised Glaze to turn professional for keeps, and Glaze came out and said himself, 'Hell, I'll do it.'"



WHOLE TRAIN DERAILED

PASSENGERS AND CREW BADLY SHAKEN ON NORTH BANK.

None Reported Hurt When Great Northern Cars Leave Tracks Near Granddallies, Washington.

Great Northern train No. 1, west-bound from St. Paul to Seattle, was derailed near Granddallies, 100 miles east of Vancouver, Wash., early yesterday morning and the passengers and train crew were badly shaken. It is reported that some of the passengers were bruised, but it is understood no serious injuries were sustained.

The accident occurred on the main line of the North Bank road. All Great Northern trains are being derailed over the North Bank via Vancouver and Spokane, on account of landslides on the Great Northern main line in the Cascade Mountains.

The entire train, consisting of engine and 11 coaches, left the rails, running on the ties for about 150 yards before it could be stopped. None of the coaches nor the engine turned over.

Difficulties were experienced in replacing the train on the tracks. The work was not completed until late last night.

Meanwhile all regular traffic on the North Bank road was suspended. Some trains were derailed over the O. W. R. & N. main line.

Vancouver Sends Wrecker.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—A Great Northern train No. 1, derailed over the North Bank road, was derailed with 11 cars at Granddallies after 3 A. M. today. No one was injured. A wrecker and crew was rushed from Vancouver at once to get the cars replaced on the rails. The passengers will be brought to the main line by the O. W. R. & N. train leaving here at 6 o'clock.
