

# VESSELS, IF ARMED, CALLED WARSHIPS

Germany and Austria Give Notice of Policy Toward Merchantmen of Allies.

DATE SET AT MARCH 1

Time Given for Entente Nations to Signify Intentions With Reference to Recent American Proposal to Disarm.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Germany and Austria, through their Embassies here, have notified the United States of their intention to treat armed merchantmen as warships after March 1. That date was fixed to give the entente allies time to signify their intention toward the recent note of the United States proposing the disarmament of all merchantmen.

The United States recently proposed to all the belligerents that the development of submarine warfare had made it desirable for all to agree that merchant ships should be absolutely unarmed—disarming even the smaller caliber guns which they have heretofore been permitted to carry.

The memorandum went forward by mail about two weeks ago. The proposal was based on the theory that no merchant ships of the Germanic powers and none of their commerce destroyers except submarines were at sea.

The Japanese case, however, which is discussed in a German merchant ruder at large, changed the situation materially and the status of the American proposal is in doubt.

Germany's contention is that this measure is justified by explicit instructions issued by the British Admiralty to merchantmen, a copy of which is said to have been obtained by the German authorities. These instructions, it is understood here, were that the merchantmen should carry guns and attack submarines on sight.

It also said that these orders have a counterpart in instructions issued by the governments of other countries at war with Germany.

**GERMANS CARRY TRENCH**  
LARGE SECTION CAPTURED FROM FRENCH IN ARTOIS.

Berlin Also Reports Capture of Crater Previously Lost—Artillery Double Still Violent.

BERLIN, via London, Feb. 10.—The capture from the French of a large section of trench north-west of Vimy, in the Artois region, was announced by German army headquarters today. A mine crater near Neuville, in the same section, was retained by the French. The Germans the French gained a foothold in a small part of one of the German first-line trenches. The statement says:

"Northwest of Vimy we captured a large trench section from the French and in the neighborhood of Neuville we captured one of the craters previously lost. Fifty-two prisoners and 22 machine guns remained in our hands."

"South of the former several attacks by the French were repulsed. Directly north of Neuville the enemy succeeded in obtaining a foothold in a small section of our foremost line trenches."

**CREW AGREES TO DEATH**  
TRAPPED U-BOAT COMMANDER SHOOT HIS MEN AND SELF.

Suffocation After Being Caught in British Net Avoided; Canadian Reports 17 Submarines Taken.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Dr. M. S. Inglis, a Canadian army surgeon, who arrived today on the Anchor Line Camerica from Liverpool, declared that he had knowledge of the capture in British nets of 17 German submarines and told how the crew of one of them had been found about to death after it had been towed ashore. Dr. Inglis said he had been allowed to descend into this submarine and had seen the bodies.

"To save them from death by suffocation," he said, "the commander had shot all his men and then himself, apparently."

Dr. Inglis said that the British are making use of glass-bottom boats with more or less success in scouting for submarines in conjunction with a hydroplane fleet.

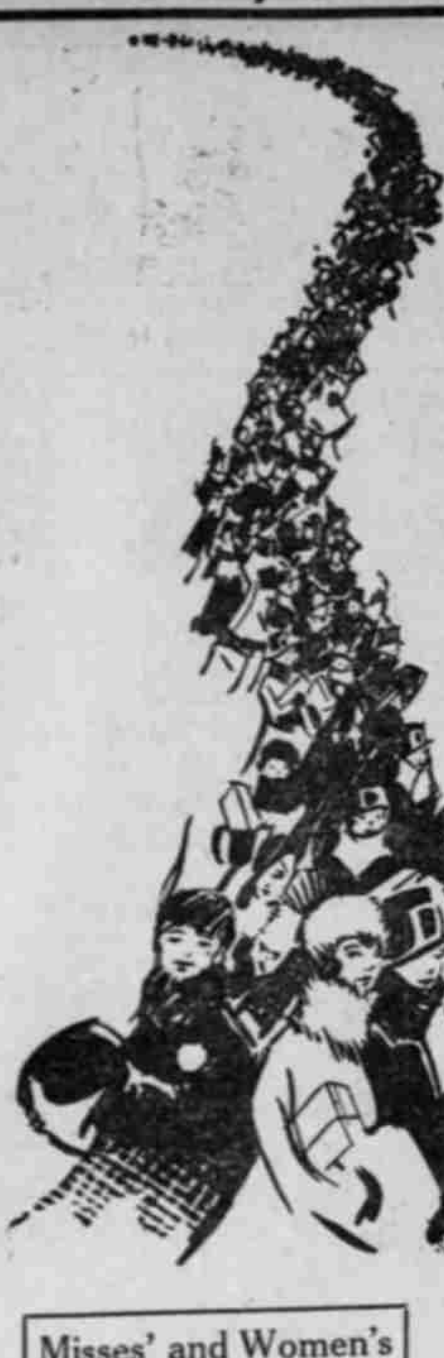
