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Only the administration of the law would be left with the War Department. It is proposed also to provide under these regulations for the coordination of enlistment periods, physical standards, and the examinations which officers appointed by state authorities must pass for an adequate reserve system for the guard and for standardized methods of recruiting.

Provision Also Will Be Made Under Which the Quota of Troops to Be Furnished by Each State and the Proportions of Artillery, Cavalry, Engineers, Signal Corps and Other Special Service Troops Would Be Determined by the War Department.

Special Federal appropriations will be proposed for the maintenance of these more costly special arm troops by the states.

It is Also Said that Duke Peter George von Oldenburg, Cousin of the Ruler of the German Principality of Oldenburg and Brother-in-Law of the Czar, Has Tended the Use of His Estates in the Trans-Caucasus for the Czar's Trans-Caucasian Guard and has ordered an inventory to be taken of the property in the vicinity of the Czar's Trans-Caucasian Guard.

WOMAN SMUGGLER JAILED

Milliner of San Francisco Pleads Guilty to Charge.

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—A sentence of 10 days in jail for failure to declare dutiable merchandise brought into this country as personal baggage, was imposed by Federal Judge Clayton today on Mrs. Rosalie Swiggett, a San Francisco milliner.

Sentence was pronounced after the woman had pleaded guilty to the charge, which was that she defrauded the Government out of duties aggregating \$537. Judge Clayton said that he regretted having to impose a harsh sentence, but that it was necessary to put a stop to smuggling.

SPRING ARRIVES ON MARS

First Thaw Cuts Rift in North Cap on Neighboring Planet.

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Feb. 11.—What appears to be the first Spring thaw on Mars for this season has just been detected by the astronomers of the Lowell Observatory in latitude 54 degrees and longitude 282 degrees. The north cap itself is in active process of melting, a circular rift having appeared half way through it which is widening and which is connected with the border by radial tributary rifts.

The cap is surrounded by a clear blue band unlike the tint of the vegetation markings.

PROHIBITION DOUBLY LOST

Kentucky Assembly Defeats Proposal Already Beaten in Senate.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 11.—After an acrimonious debate, in the course of which a personal encounter between Representative Humphrey and Representative Harvey was averted by other Legislators, the lower House of the General Assembly defeated today a proposition to submit to the voters of Kentucky a state-wide prohibition constitutional amendment.

The measure previously had been lost in the Senate.

JOJO IS HIMSELF AGAIN

WINE RESTORES HEALTH OF ZOO MONKEY PROHIBITION SUFFERER.

Prohibition may be all right, but not at the Washington Park zoo, according to Zoo Keeper Herman. Jojo, the big zoo monkey, was very fond of liquor before the town went dry, and during the cold spell, without his customary daily wine, he contracted pneumonia. Nothing could be done apparently to fix him up until Herman resorted, as a last resort, to try some wine.

Jojo is now himself once more.

NEW TERRITORY IS URGED

California Would Empower President to Buy Lower California.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—A resolution to authorize President Wilson to negotiate with Mexico for the purchase of Lower California was presented to the House today by Representative Randall, of California.

Such a purchase, the resolution recites, would protect irrigation work in the Imperial Valley. The resolution was referred to the foreign affairs committee.

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Young Man's Arrest Leads to Information That He Is Rich.

CHICAGO, Feb. 11.—Keith Edward Dalrymple wore flashy clothing and for this reason was taken to the police station by detectives today. Had it not been for this, Dalrymple would not have known that he was held to \$490,000. Police had been on the lookout for him for four years to tell him so.

Young Dalrymple ran away from his home at Bloomington, Ark., in 1905. His father prospered in the oil business and died four years ago. The runaway was the heir.

Ban on Liquor Advertising Asked.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Delegations from Maine, Alabama and Mississippi today urged the House postal committee to recommend passage of the Abercrombie bill, barring any kind of liquor advertising whatsoever from mails in states having laws against liquor advertisements.

FLAGS WILL FLY TODAY.

An appeal to raise flags throughout the city today, which is the anniversary of Lincoln's birthday, was made yesterday by S. D. Vincent, chairman of the civic bureau of the Chamber of Commerce. In response to a request from Mr. Vincent, Superintendent Alderman agreed yesterday to have flags unfurled on all school buildings today. It is suggested that the colors also be displayed on all business buildings and also throughout the business district.

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
