Something struck Mr. Putio in the face as he slumbered yesterday morning at 5 o'clock. It struck again, then it scored and scratched the skin. In the thickening smoke of his burning home he awoke, with the family pussy clawing at his face to arouse him. After reaching the open air the owner, wild with frenzy at the loss of his new furniture, turned into the swirling smoke again to salvage what he cevild.

The efforts of the cat might have gone for naught, for Mr. Putis was dazed by the smoke, had it not been for the timely aid of Clifford Thompson, a 16-year-old newspaper carrier, who played the role of providence in the second rescue.


