ST. JOHN'S NIGHT SCHOOL CLASSES DEPLETED

Classes at the James John High School were somewhat depleted in January and during the present month, and an effort is being made to increase the attendance by those interested in maintaining the school. In fact, the duration of the classes depends on the filling up of the classes. M. L. Pratt, the principal, calls special attention to the branches taught at this night school, which include elementary studies in the common branches. There are commercial courses including shorthand, typewriting, bookkeeping and commercial arithmetic. A special class is taught for foreigners who wish to learn and write English. A class in sewing, domestic science and instruction in home economics. It is planned to add classes in Spanish, public speaking and class. A class in mechanical drawing is taught in the course.

Former Capitalist of Waitsburg Passes at 83. FOUNDRY OF DENVER AIDED. Wife Is Believed First White Girl Born in Idaho—Body to Be Sent to Washington Town for Burial After Death Here.

The body of William G. Preston, who died at the home of his son, C. B. Preston, 549 East Twenty-third street North, Sunday night, at the age of 83 years, will be sent for burial to Waitsburg, Wash., where Mr. Preston had been engaged in the flour milling industry for many years.
