GEORGE L. HUTCHIN, for years manager of the Portland Rose Festival, president of the Festival Association of the Pacific Coast, and more recently active in the management of the pageants, spectacles and parades of the Panama-Pacific Exposition, is in the motion picture field. He is secretary-manager of the \$250,000 Continental Producing Company, which plans to produce a 12-reel feature, "The Spirit of '76."

Robert Goldstein, president of the Goldstein Theatrical Costuming Company, of Los Angeles and San Francisco, a large stockholder of the Epoch Company, which produced the Clansman, and who is associated with D. W. Griffith and other motion picture magnates, is head of the concern.

Mr. Griffith, now engaged in making his largest feature, "The Mother and the Law," is interested in the new venture.

In the prospectus of the new company the figures are presented showing that "The Clansman" paid more than 900 per cent profit in one year, and the net income amounted to more than \$2,000,000.

Mr. Hutchin was a resident of Portland for many years and has property interests here.

**Film Innovation Introduced.**  
A new feature for the motion picture industry has been introduced in Los Angeles in which legitimate and vaudeville actors who wish to get into pictures can have test films made.

The company has opened a studio and will make from 75 to 100 feet of film for players. These may be viewed by directors and producers, and thus it will make the selection of types a much simpler matter.

The production concern is styled the Mutual Test Film Company.

### BOYS TOLD TO FARM

Governor at Barlow Grange Speaks of Development.

### MIDDLEMAN IS OPPOSED

Revision of Sales Methods Advocated to Obtain Better Prices for Farmer—Dry Law Believed of Benefit to State.

OREGON CITY, Or., Feb. 22.—(Special.)—Governor Withycombe spoke at a meeting today of the Twentieth Century Grange, at Barlow, on "George Washington and Agriculture." The two subjects wove themselves together, he said, because the Nation's first President was a farmer, as well as a soldier and statesman.

The Governor made a strong plea for boys and girls to stick to the farm. The Willamette Valley, which he declared was fertile and large enough to support 5,000,000 persons, offers an unusually attractive future for the tillers of the soil.

One of the principal problems that confronts the granges of the state, Governor Withycombe said, was the adoption of a plan whereby the large marginal difference between the price the producer receives and the price the consumer pays be eliminated in the interests of the farmer. The prohibition law, the Governor declared, put the people of the state in a better position to reap the benefit of the state's natural advantages.

O. W. Eastham, Oregon City attorney, explained preparedness, President Eisenhower of the Pomona Grange; Professor Barst and L. J. Allen, of the Oregon Agricultural College, and County School Supervisor Vedder were on the day's programme.

The meeting began at 10 o'clock this morning, and Governor Withycombe arrived from Salem unattended at 10:30. He was received at the station by a committee from the grange, which was headed by President Giddings. Mr. Giddings and Miss Pearl Hays, secretary of the grange, had charge of the program. At 11 o'clock a luncheon was served by the women of the grange.

After the luncheon the afternoon session was called to order by Mrs. Anna M. White. Members of the executive committee of the grange explained the purpose of the organization.
